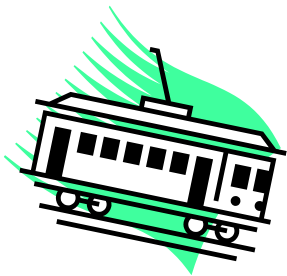

1815 – Depart for Swan Point Inn and Restaurant. It is a short walk or hitch a ride. There will be cars available for those who want to ride.

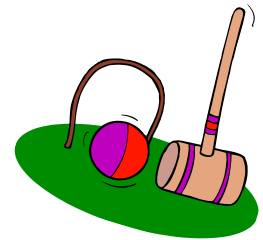


1830 – Cash Bar, Hot and Cold Hors D'oeuvres on the restaurant's outdoor deck weather permitting.

A TRIP TO NOAA

For the fifth year in a row, Chris and I attended the NOAA Workshop. It is always held the last weekend in April. The workshop, itself is held at NOAA Headquarters at the Atlantic Marine Center, in Norfolk. The facility where everyone stays is in beautiful, vibrant, downtown Portsmouth, VA. at the old historic Governor Dinwiddie Hotel. It is only seven stories and small, but very beautiful and it has been restored and modernized.

Downtown Portsmouth has a lot of wonderful restaurants (no chains) within walking distance with many eclectic shops, museums and old beautiful churches. It also has a pretty waterfront with a river walk. It is picture postcard pretty and very walkable and bikable. If you run out of things to do in Portsmouth, which would be hard to do in a weekend, you can also hop on the ferry for a 15 minute trip to Norfolk's waterfront. If you are a senior it only cost 50 cents.

The weekend begins on Friday evening with a cocktail party for all participants. The cost is included in your reservation fee. Dinner that night is on your own. For the last three years, a large group of us have elected to go to Commodore Theater, only a 1/2 block away, for dinner and a movie. The Commodore is also an historic building that has been beautifully restored. They took the whole mezzanine, created a tiered, carpeted floor and furnished it with tables for two or four, comfy, armed, swiveled, upholstered chairs, a telephone, a small lamp and a menu. Read the menu, pick up the phone, order and voila, drinks, hors d'oeuvres, and then dinner in a comfy chair while watching the movie.

We got up early on Saturday and drove across the river to NOAA where we checked in and had coffee and crispy crème doughnuts. Then we got to work. The attendees are divided into six groups. Each group will attend six different classes in separate classrooms including one on the water. We attend three classes and then get a lunch break. Lunch is a very good box lunch provided by a local gourmet caterer. The box includes a delicious sandwich, a bag of gourmet chips, a great pickle and a home-made pastry. Bottled sodas and water are available. After lunch there are three more classes. The classes teach you the types of Coop Charting that we can do, how to do them, how to document them and how to report them. The class on the water involves actually charting the depths of a small section of the river. After our last class, the group reconvenes for a wrap up session, to receive our certificates of completion and the raffle drawings. For the last few years other districts have learned about this event and have attended. This year we had New York, North Carolina and Florida districts represented. Except for our educational courses, of all the squadron, District and National events I have attended over many years, the NOAA workshop has taught me the most in the shortest amount of time. You do need to be interested in keeping our waters safe and our charts up to date. Even if you aren't into charting, the weekend is so much fun, convivial and it is located in a town you will be glad you got to know. And, you may even find out, you would like to get into charting. It can be a fun time with family and/or friends. It is a great educational activity for those of you with children. They learn to read charts, to be observant and compare what they read to what they actually see and understand the significance of the value of valid information on the water and how safe it keeps them.

About 1600, classes are over and back we went to the Dinwiddie. At 1700 it's cocktail party time again in the hotel and the banquet. The cocktails and hors d'oeuvres are provided by D/5 and the banquet is catered by the Dinwiddie. The dinner this year was crab cakes and steak. Yum! Best of all was the camaraderie among everyone. You really get to know your classmates after a full day together.

Sunday is departure time, but you really hate to leave such a pretty town, so we dragged our heels and went down to the waterfront for a sumptuous Sunday Brunch buffet at the Renaissance Hotel - a wonderful conclusion to a wonderful weekend.

We are so fortunate to have NOAA in our back yard. D/5 is so unique and so blessed with so many opportunities to educate on the water since we are situated on the Bay - and Delhigh is fortunate to be a part of D/5.

Try it. You will enjoy, you will learn and you might even go every year for several in a row. It is highly possible that you will "get into it" and find yet another way to enjoy a trip on the Bay with family and friends and contribute to keeping our boating community safe.

2011 Lake Beltzville Environmental Clean-up and Vessel Safety Checks

Members and friends of the Delhigh Power Squadron arrived Saturday morning at the beautiful Lake Beltzville State Park, to conduct their annual trash and debris clean-up along the shoreline and trails that surround the lake, and perform courtesy Vessel Safety Checks, to kick off the beginning of National Safe Boating Week.

"We arrived at the lake to find cooperative, sunny, warm weather to find and pick-up as much trash as possible," said friend of the squadron Mark Rendish, brother of organizer and P/C Bob Rendish.

And trash they did find. Within the time they went searching and collecting debris and trash, four teams arrived back at the dumpster at the Pine Run boat ramp with a broken wheel barrow, a child's plastic chair, a piece of angled 4"by 4" timber (3' long used in some construction project), and a Goodyear tire and wheel assembly that was removed off the shoreline. Also, included with these fine pieces of debris were 5 large garbage bags filled with assorted trash.

"All in a fine day's work of boating and helping to clean up a popular boating and picnic destination," exclaimed member Keith Knoblach.

As well as the collection of trash, our second purpose was to make available to as many boaters as possible, free Courtesy Vessel Safety Checks. This sunny, warm Saturday morning saw the anglers and the recreational boaters coming out to boat after over a week of rainy weather. Some were getting their boats out for the first time, and these boaters very much appreciated the Delhigh Power Squadron performing these important safety checks, to make them, their families and their friend's safer boaters on America's waterways.

We had 3 Vessel Safety Check examiners on duty conducting the VSC's along with our new Squadron Commander, Rich Norris, overseeing the checks, handing out information about our next public Safe Boating Course, and talking to the various boaters about membership in the squadron, and our more advanced classes.

The examiners conducted a total of 19 Vessel Safety Checks, all passed with the exception of 2.

After the work was completed, everybody gathered at a picnic pavilion overlooking the lake for a superb lunch, cooked by the commander. (Everyone knows it's a good idea to keep Rendish away from all cooking duties). "These hotdogs were the best I've ever tasted," proclaimed Cyruss Nowroozani, whose wife Kathleen helped to organize and make this event a success.

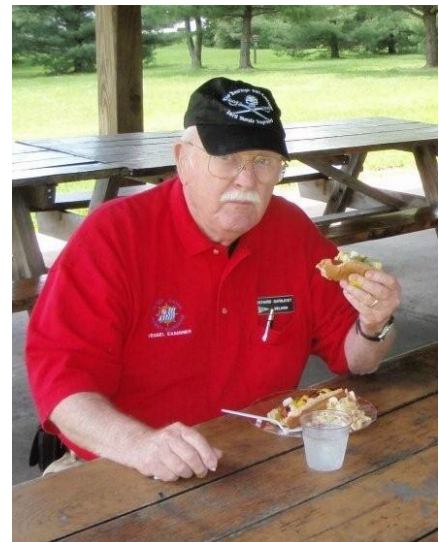

As we begin our new boating season, a few things are important to us. First and most important is safe boating. To remind us of this, we observe Safe Boating Week 21-27 May. Our safe boating slogan continues, WEAR IT, and that refers to our life jackets-PFD's- that should not lay hidden in the depths of our boats. My challenge to you is get them out and take a look at their integrity, and always let the crew and guests know where they are hidden on your boat. My philosophy on this is changing over the years as my strength and stamina now allow me to swim 10 feet rather than 100 yds. Concussion is a major problem falling overboard. If no one sees you fall, and concussion occurs, than life longevity is challenged.....Be Aware! I recently purchased Ginny an inflatable jacket she now wears while tending the lines on One More Time. Please take heed to my warning.....we need to retain all our members as long as possible. We celebrated Safe Boating Week by visiting Beltzville Lake each year to tell the Safe Boating story, do Vessel Safety Checks, and do some water/land cleanup projects at the lake. The USCG reports boating fatalities each year, in 2009 the number was 736. USPS education efforts on safe boating helps to save lives each year. This effort we do as Delhigh members allow us to save lives, holding the number of deaths below 800 countrywide for the last 11 years. Although we would like it to continue to decline to zero, our efforts matter and the USCG tells us so. Let's not let them down and continue to work hard on safe boating education. In case you have not heard, there is a strong forum of safe boating advocates out there who believe that wearing of PFD's on small boats 18ft or less should be mandatory. Is this also your opinion? Think about it, recreation including fishing and on small boats while inebriated is the major cause of death on the water.

Now, let me change the subject to another area that we can participate in while satisfying our civic responsibility as USPS members and help keep our non-profit status as an organization alive and well. How many times are we out on the water and notice something does not agree with our paper or electronic charts. If you haven't noticed these errors, you may not be using your charts! Or, if you have noticed the discrepancies, apathetically, you did not report your important obser-

vation. So let's make this simple. I agree that reporting the observation on the CCWEB, Co-Operative Charting Website, maybe a challenge to you. Understandably, I recognize that this cumbersome procedure may be overwhelming to many. So, let's solve the problem. We all have cell phones with cameras. We all have a GPS that tells us exactly where we are. When you see a chart discrepancy, use your cell phone camera and take a picture, write down the longitude and latitude, and write up a simple description of the problem. Send this to your Squadron Executive Officer and the report will be filed by the CC Committee. Also record your time and when several reports are made, this time may be sufficient for you to earn a Merit Mark. For a simple example, you pass a red daymarker and you see that half of the marker is missing perhaps because a careless boater hit and broke it off. Take the picture, record the L&Lo, and write two sentences, send all e-mail to me and you're done! There are many other ways we can become involved in Co-Op Charting around the water. In the future, if you wish, we can begin to understand some of the other things we can do. One other good word is "GEODITICS"; it's coming back. So stay tuned to the return of some of the Geodetic FUN adventures that we as Delhigh members have participated and experienced in the past.

Lastly, let me remind you of the Delhigh Rendezvous 24-26 June. Plans are made and we need you to come and help celebrate our 50th and some new activities that you cannot miss. Please see the articles and reservation forms in this Delhighlights issue and come to Haven Harbour in Rock Hall to enjoy the festivities.

VESSEL SAFETY CORNER

Delhigh VSE's participated in the National Safe Boating Week Campaign, 21 May 2011, at Beltzville Lake. VE's Dick Garnjost, SN, and Kathleen Nowroozani, JN, conducted 13 vessel safety checks. The days statistics were 11 boats passed and received a VSC Decal and 2 boats failed. Michael Lebeduik, III, AP approached 5 boat owners to conduct a courtesy VSC. The owners were in a hurry to get on the water – it was the first day it did not rain and the sun was out in about two weeks, the normal response was, "we will do it next week."

Discrepancies found ranged from outdated flares and inoperative lights Hull Identification Numbers on the registration card not matching the HIN # on the vessel. Not all boats pass a VSC and that is OK. A few of the boat owners look forward to having a VSC conducted each year.

We are doing our part as VSE's, by educating the public about state and federal requirements.

Boaters must learn to respect water

I have had some of my best days on the water and I have had some of my worst days on the water.

On one trip off the coast of Delaware, I remember bumbling through a realm of fog with a broken radar unit. In Alaska's famed Inside Passage, I got clobbered by a storm so fierce I was convinced the day would be my last.

But it's not just me. If you want, I can introduce you to a person that nearly got run over by a drunken boater. Or how would you like to meet a man who spent 16 hours treading water six miles offshore all because he slipped off the deck and left his life jacket stowed beneath the seats? He's lucky he survived.

There's no doubt a trip to the lake or bay makes for a great day. But without proper planning or the right equipment, it can turn into an utter disaster in mere seconds.

Saturday marks the start of the National Safe Boating Week. From now through the start of Memorial Day weekend, boaters will be bombarded with safety messages. I'm here to help spread the word.

Safe boating starts in a place we could all spend some more time, the mass of squishy stuff between our ears known as our brain. If you hit the water without proper knowledge, you're taking a gamble.

While Pennsylvania doesn't require all boaters to pass a safety course, the few hours it takes to get a basic education is time well spent. Even for the old salts, a quick review of the books is a good way to keep things fresh.

One thing everybody should know is life jackets save lives. In 2009, 543 people drowned in boating-related accidents across the country. Only 87 of them were wearing life jackets. The math doesn't lie. Put a life jacket on before you hit the water.

Just like wearing a life jacket should be common sense, so should the idea that alcohol and boats don't mix. Not only is it illegal to operate a boat under the influence of alcohol, it can be equally as deadly with a boatload of tipsy friends.

As an example I point to a quick-moving storm that hit boaters on the Susquehanna River last summer. One minute, it was a beautiful July day. The next, it was flat-out dangerous to be anywhere near the water.

People scrambled to get their boats and passengers off the water. It took the help of everybody onboard to do it. It wasn't the time to be babysitting an inebriated passenger or two.

On the water, you never know when trouble will strike. If you're not prepared or don't have the knowledge to deal with the obstacles thrown your way, Mother Nature will take you out.

It's not hard to stay safe and enjoy a day on the water. All it takes is knowledge and some planning. But the water must be respected.

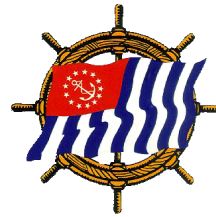
