Thank you P/C Kathy Nash, AP-IN, for setting up the ASPS kayaking trip to Chesapeake Bay Environmental Center (CBEC) on Sunday, 11 July. The weather was perfect, the instructors outstanding, and our group had a blast. Joining us were Cdr Tony Martin, JN, and Noreen Martin, Lt/C Peggy Slattery, S, and Terry Slattery, 1st/Lt

After a very informative introduction class, we headed out to gather our kayaks and get them set up for our adventure. One by one our kayaks entered the water, and we gathered together for last minute instruction. Our tour included 5 stops along the tall grasses to include observing an osprey nest, an eagle nest, and information about how the bay has been changing over the years. After the kayaking, we met at The Bridges Restaurant for some dinner and drinks.



Lock Waypoints box. Remember to uncheck this to adjust the route later.




Route/Track/Waypoints/Laver- Manager.

This tool lets you name the route and do an exciting thing. Click on the route and select *Export*; selected from the side menu; you can make an GPX file of the route and all of its waypoints. This file type can be imported to most chart plotters and other charting software, like INavX. Once imported, the route you just made with OpenCPN is now usable in your chart plotter and autopilot.

If the device where you have OpenCPN installed has a built in GPS, it will use that to put your position on the chart and have the boat follow your course just like your chart plotter. External GPS will allow you to use OpenCPN with a device that doesn't have a GPS. Most can be made to work with tablets and laptops.

Caution! When you shop, look for the GPS rated to work with the Operating system you have, like Windows 10, Windows or Apple OS for Macs. Between Windows 8 and Windows 10, Microsoft made a big change in how GPS and GPSS (Global Navigation Satellite Systems) talk to the navigation software. The GPS can be connected to USB or Bluetooth. It is also possible to link you Smartphone's GPS to your computer.

Navigation in the GPS age OpenCPN, Part 3

Hopefully, you have been to https://opencpn.org/ and have downloaded the program and installed charts from NOAA. Just a reminder- if things don't work the way you would like, there is no issue with uninstalling the program and doing it again.

OpenCPN is a great planning tool. It is very easy to preplan a trip, and then export the plan to your chart plotter, your phone, another computer, or tablet.




Create Route

The Create Route tool is one of the easiest tools to use. Click on the tool to turn it on. The cursor becomes a pencil. Put it near where you want to begin your trip, and click the mouse. Then, near the end of the trip, click the mouse again. Then go to the Create Route tool and click to turn off the tool. You now have the beginning of the route. Right clicking is another way to turn off the Create Route tool.


Next, zoom in and drag the first waypoint to where you want it. To modify the route, put the pointer on the route line, right click, choose Insert Waypoint. Then, drag the waypoint and route to where you need it to be. Keep doing this until you have a safe route to your destination. You may adjust any waypoint on the route by dragging it where you need it.

Keep in mind that it is very easy to move a waypoint. Scrolling through your chart, you can accidentally hit a waypoint and move it. In order to avoid this, when you finish your route lock the waypoints. You can easily do this by going to the Tools Menu-Display-Advance Menu. Check the





Safety

Boating events are the highlight of the ASPS boating season on the Bay. These include cruises, rendezvous and raft ups. Our raft ups usually begin in May with a raft up at the mouth of the Severn River to watch the Blue Angels practice. We generally have a raft up each month of the boating season. Let's consider raft up etiquette and procedures to ensure everyone has a safe and fun event.

Each raft up has a raft up captain who is in charge of the process of getting the participating boats safely into the raft up. Ideally, raft ups should be formed with the largest boats in the center and the smaller boats joining by descending size.

This is not always possible depending on order of arrival of participants. The largest boat will set up with a strong anchor set. Depending on the size of the raft up, other boats may have to drop an anchor as well. This will normally be decided by the raft up captain.

On approaching the raft up, you should contact the raft up captain on the pre-designated VHF channel or by cell phone to get guidance on which end of the raft up to tie up to. Alternatively, you may approach the raft up at idle speed and get directions from the raft up captain by hand signals.

Loiter a safe distance from the raft up and rig your fenders and lines on the appropriate side. You will need at least 2, and preferably more, of the largest fenders that you have available. The larger the fenders the better when rafting up. You will need at least three lines, pre-rigged before approaching the raft-up. Approach at idle speed, parallel to the boat you are tying up to maintaining a 3-5 foot gap. Stop headway when your stern is even with theirs. The first line to hand over is the bow line, followed by the stern line. With those lines in hand, they can pull you over to close the gap. Keep your engine running and in neutral. Hand over the aft spring line and tie the spring line up first. Adjust tension on the spring line so that the boats' transoms are about even. For sail boats, ensure that spreaders are clear of the adjacent boat's spreaders or fly bridge hardware. The second line to make fast is the bow line. Lastly the stern line is tied off. Fenders can be adjusted and other lines added as needed. Now you can shut down the engines. As the captain of your vessel, it is your responsibility to ensure that fenders and lines are correctly rigged and secure. Your responsibilities as captain of your vessel can never delegated to the raft up captain.

In the event that the raft-up captain deems that you should drop an anchor before joining the raft up, you would approach the raft up much like you would if you were to tie up, but continue on beyond the bow of the tie up boat to the spot you want to drop anchor. After dropping anchor you would slowly back down to the tie up boat, maintaining a 3-5 foot gap and then begin to pass lines, stern line first, then bow line. Tie up of lines should be in the same order as previously discussed with the aft spring line made fast first.

During the raft up you may move between boats, preferably across their transoms. Always avoid stepping on hatches and only enter cabins when invited.

When leaving the raft-up, you must always notify the raft up captain first. Ensure there is nobody in the water behind you and no lines dangling off the boat that could foul your prop. The order of releasing the lines is as follows; first the stern line, then the aft spring line and lastly the bow line. The reason for this sequence is that the raft up will be facing into the prevailing wind and/or current, whichever is has the most effect. The working lines are the bow and spring lines and the real load will be on the spring line. When the spring line is released, the boat will move backward and your bow will move toward the other boat. This is when the forward fenders become very important. Your bow line, still made fast, keeps your boat facing into the wind or current and parallel with the raft up. Once the bow line is released, gently back away.


A couple of special situations are worth mentioning. If you are not on the end of the raft up when it's time for you to leave, the integrity of the raft up must be maintained as you back out. The raft up captain must be made aware and more assistance will be needed. A loose bow line will have to be rigged between the boats on either side of you. A very loose stern line will have to be rigged across your bow such that when you back out, the two adjacent boats can pull the raft up back together. If you happen to have an anchor out, then the best course of action is to break up the raft up and reform it after you have gone.

If your gunnels are badly mismatched with the boats on both sides of you, then the best thing to do is to pull out and reform the raft up such that the smaller boats are on the outside of the larger ones. If you are a smaller boat and arrive early, be prepared to pull out as the larger boats arrive.

If you are alone on your boat, you can still enjoy the camaraderie of a raft up. Notify the raft up captain that you are alone. Rig your lines such that they can be easily picked up by a boat hook and brought over to the boat you are tying up to.

Raft ups with ASPS are tremendous fun. They are more fun when everyone is aware of what is expected. Let's get out there and keep raft ups safe and fun events on the water.


