Spring Commissioning—you love it when it's done, and you hate it when it's being done. Commissioning is a necessary step to ensure that your boat systems are functional and the vessel seaworthy. While many of us leave it to a boat yard to ready a boat, most of us perform some of the necessary tasks before launching. Whether someone does it for you or you do it yourself it is a good idea to check that everything is in working order and good condition before getting underway. In so doing, we comply with that old saw to "know your boat."

Knowing your boat is part of good seamanship. It helps build your confidence and adds another layer of safety for your family, friends and pets. If you are not sure about the systeams on your boat, a good way to start is by taking some

seminars or courses in the off season. You can supplement that by reading boating/sailing publications and enrolling in some of the online webinars offered by the *United States Power Squadron*<sup>®</sup>. Perhaps the best way to learn the workings of your vessel is to shadow the professional, who is taking on a needed task beyond your skill level.

A commissioning checklist and maintenance log are helpful. Those documents when coupled with a visual inspection may save money, avoid an inconvenience, or even save a life. In our haste to launch, it is not unusual to make a mental note and not be reminded of a needed item until you have family and friends out on the water. The checklist and log avoid that scenario. When developing your checklist don't overlook medical supplies, batteries and other items that may have expiration dates or short lives. You should also check the condition of your life jackets and emergency equipment. Better yet, have one of our Vessel Safety Examiners give your boat a complete inspection!

Keep in mind that commissioning is just part of the overall maintenance of your vessel. During the season make note of things that not only need to be done, but those that might add to the boating experience. Rafting up with other boaters and sailors is a good way to gain ideas of how to make the time on the water more convenient and enjoyable. Having said that, you are invited to review our activities and events calendar and join us on the water. You would be hard pressed to find a friendlier and more welcoming group than *America's Boating Club of Annapolis*.

# Navigation in the GPS age **OpenCPN**

I gave an impromptu presentation on OpenCPN at the membership dinner meeting on 4 May. Here are

some of the highlights of that presentation.

USPS is about education, and a large part of that education is navigation. Where am I? Is it safe to go there? These are the critical questions. In the age of GPS and fast computers that we carry with us (a smart phone), we can now have a very powerful and accurate navigation tool in our pocket - a chart plotter. There is a new application that works on PCs, Macintosh, and Android phones and tablets - OpenCPN. It is free to use, and it utilizes the free NOAA Charts. It is designed to be used at the helm station of your boat while underway. Chart a course and track your position right from your laptop, tablet or phone.

The United States Power Squadrons® has officially replaced all other charting software for instruction and now uses OpenCPN. OpenCPN is what is

called open source. It is being developed by volunteers interested in navigation software, and they do accept donations. To get a copy for your PC or Macintosh, all you need to do is go to OpenCPN.org. There you will find links to the installation files and other resources like the manual. For Android devices like a phone or tablet use the Play Store App - in the search box, type in OpenCPN. The app will show up in the search. Install it from there. Do not install the paid version. Also, do this when you have WiFi access so you don't use up all your data allowance. For those who are Iphone and Ipad users, I will discuss an app that is now available for both in an later article.

Do you have a device with a built-in GPS? Most phones today do. Or, do you have an external GPS to attach to your device? After downloading the app and the free charts from NOAA, you will have a fully functional chart plotter! An external GPS is not that expensive, and any of them are very good. It is also possible to link many of the older handheld GPS's to a laptop computer. This will let you use what you already have. This also means that you can have multiple redundant chart plotting devices on your boat without a big investment!

This software has a surprising amount of functionality - so much that you probably will not use but a fraction of its capability at first. But, you do not need to learn much to begin using it. There is a very good online manual, and a Google search for OpenCPN will find countless article and videos on the software. If you are a Facebook user, there is a Facebook group. And, most of the cruising groups have discussion groups posing and answering questions. There is also a blog by David Burch, an instructor for Starpath School of Navigation, that you can check out- David Burch Blog. The resources available also help make OpenCPN a worthwhile application. In the summer issues of The Anchor Watch, I will devote a

segment of the news to OpenCPN and point out some of the features I find very useful.

# **BOATING IS FUN**

Every year is the same thing – We keep watching the weather so we can safely put the boat back in the water, without the danger of freezing you or the boat. Betty and I both have houses and docks on the water – one at Deep Creek Lake in western Maryland, and the other on the South river near Annapolis and just two miles from the Chesapeake Bay. Betty has a 20' Mastercraft Ski Boat which she skis behind in warm weather, while I have a 38' Sea Ray Sundancer that I use for summer cruising on the Bay. Betty is 86, and I am 85.

Last summer we found a new exciting type of boating - Cocktail Class Boat Racing. We watched these races behind the Kent Island Yacht Club the year before, and decided we had to try it. I told Betty I would build the race boat, if she would drive it. So, after I twisted her arm, she agreed. The boats are 8 feet long, built to an exact design, and carry a 6 hp motor. I built ours from a kit, sold by Chesapeake Light Craft. To drive it, you kneel in the boat and when you lean forward and hit the throttle, she hops up on plane. You are immediately going about 22 mph. Wow, what a ride! The race course is laid out with left and right turns, with no more than 6 boats in each race. There are 3 classes- you must not weigh over 130 lbs, 160 lbs. or 200 lbs, so Betty raced in the 130-lb. class, I raced in the 160-lb. class, and my grandson Timmy raced in the 200-lb. class. We raced at four different sites. Betty won a 3<sup>rd</sup> place, and Timmy won a 2<sup>nd</sup> and a 3<sup>rd</sup>- I didn't quite make the winners circle, but it was a blast.

### Safety

The days are long and the sun is traveling as close to directly over head as it is going to get at our latitude. It is time to talk seriously about safety in the sun.

A couple of interesting statistics:

★As we grow older, men are 3 times more likely to get skin cancer than women. ★In the past three decades, more people have had skin cancer than all other cancers combined!

★All sun exposure is dangerous. You make all the vitamin D that you can make in one day within 15-20 minutes of sun exposure. So, vitamin D is not a healthy

reason to expose yourself to the sun.

Since the activity of boating puts us outdoors for large blocks of time, usually during the peak sun hours of 1000 to 1400, we're all more susceptible to this type of cancer. Aside from staying out of the sun altogether, there is really only one way to protect yourself - stay covered. Covering involves three things - clothes and hats that block UV, sunglasses that block UV, and sunscreen. Let's focus on sunscreen.

There are two basic types of sunscreen - physical and chemical. Physical sunscreens generally contain titanium dioxide or zinc oxide. They sit on top of your skin to deflect UV rays from penetrating and doing damage. They are often thicker, greasy, and less comfortable. They need total coverage in order to form a shield from the sun. But, they last a long time and continue to protect as long as they sit on top of your skin.

Chemical sunscreens contain organic compounds (oxybenzone, octinoxate, octisalate, and avobenzone) that are able to convert UV rays into heat. The heat is released from your skin, and you become protected from the UV. They are usually thinner and more comfortable. Less is required since a physical barrier is not needed. But, they typically need 20 minutes on your skin before they work. Because they are consumed through the UV conversion to heat, you have to apply more often. It's this last point that most of us fail to do: re-apply more sunscreen as if your life depends on it.

It's also important to recognize that over-exposure to chemicals absorbed by your skin might also create a risk. Some chemical sunscreens may even cause skin irritation to some individuals. It's imperative that you look into the sunscreen you're selecting and make sure that the chemical makeup isn't putting you in contact with substances that are more dangerous than the sun. Selecting a sunscreen by the lowest price might not be the healthiest way to proceed. The Environmental Working Group is an organization that, among other things, tests nearly all sunscreens every year and produces a report about their findings:



# PREDICTED LOG CONTEST (MODIFIED)

A Predicted Log Contest for boats of all sizes is great fun and a test of your boating skills. The electronic age has made it so easy to punch in your destination on the chart plotter and follow the blue route line to get there.

Wouldn't it be fun to calculate your ETA to that destination and compete with another boat over the same course? And for money?

# Let me tell you how:

The course on the chart and starting point would be given out the week before. This would give you time to calculate your overall time to navigate the course at your chosen speed. (6 -12 knots allowable); Remember 60D = ST.

When you pass the starting buoy, you start your watch and write down your predicted time to navigate the course. When you finish the course and pass the finish buoy, you stop your watch and write down your actual time to run the course. No observer needed - this would be done on the honor system.

Closest actual time to your predicted time wins 1st prize money, next closest, 2<sup>nd</sup> prize money, and next, 3<sup>rd</sup> prize money.

You will need to know how fast you boat is going at say 1300 rpm, and you can adjust speed on the course for wind and current, but GPS and individual leg time will not be allowed.

With 5 or 6 boats and a \$20 entry fee, we could have some nice prize money.


