The information about your boat will not be reported to anyone but you. You will ensure that your boat meets all

federal, state, and local safety equipment requirements. You might even get a discount on your boating insurance. You will certainly get information about equipment that needs replacing or would be a good addition to your boat. Once you see how valuable this service is, you might even want to consider volunteering to become a VSC examiner.

Speaking of purchasing new equipment --- the best place to look at equipment you might need or want is a boat show. The Annapolis Spring Sailboat Show happens this month on 26-28 April. We **need** volunteers to work this event. Manning our booth at boat shows is an important job. Your service can lead to new members as well as spreading information about what we do. Please think about joining other members for three hours. You get free admission to the show, allowing you to shop for all those things on your equipment list from your VSC! 








The Strange and Wonderful Science Of Blue Crabs





Safety P/C Jeff Short, JN-IN

This safety article is about how to avoid falling off your boat. I will not mention a thing about life jackets, tethers, lifelines or MOB (man overboard) drills. Yes, falling off your boat while underway is very dangerous, but so is falling off your boat while it's in its slip and particularly when it is blocked up high in the boatyard. As the weather improves, many of us will begin working on our boats in earnest. The most common and sometimes most serious boat yard accidents involve falls.

As an emergency physician, I hate ladders! I have seen devastating, life changing injuries due to falls from ladders. I don't mean just tall ladders.

Serious injuries occur from relatively small heights such as falls off step ladders.

★ My number one recommendation is to stay off ladders! Particularly if you are over 35-40, stay off ladders if at all possible. Pay somebody to do the work or enlist the help of a younger person. When an older person falls from any height, they are significantly more likely to sustain catastrophic, life changing injuries. I won't go on a ladder if at all possible.



* But if your boat is in the boatyard, up on blocks, the only way to get into it is to climb a ladder. In that case, be sure you have somebody with you to physically hold and stabilize the ladder as you climb and descend. Climbing a ladder, whether at home or at the boatyard, ideally requires two people and should never be done alone. If I have to climb a ladder, I want a crowd assembled.



- * You can't always get someone to come to the boat yard to help you. The third, and least desirable, option is to be sure you can get someone's attention in case you fall and need assistance. Boatyards can be lonely places at times, and it could be quite some time before someone finds you laying there. It's kind of like filing a float plan before you set out on the water. Let someone at the boatyard know that you are there. Always keep your cell phone in your possession. It's tempting to take the cell phone and leave it "in a safe place" while you do your work, but it will do you no good at all sitting safely on the chart table if you are lying injured after an 8 foot fall from your boat.
- * Use the ladder correctly. People get a kick out of all the warning signs posted up on ladders these days. Read them! They are the result of "lessons learned" from past unfortunate ladder events.
- ★ Be absolutely sure that your ladder is long enough to do the job. Never use the top two rungs of the ladder. If your ladder happens to be just a bit short, but you think you can make do "just this one time," don't do it! Nothing on your boat is worth the risk of permanent injury.
- ★ Double check the placement of the ladder each time you use it. The feet should be on level, firm ground. Avoid gravel and mud. (Ha! Good luck with that. You're in a boat yard after all.) Find a level spot to put the ladder. Do not prop up one foot of the ladder to make it level with the other foot. Always tie or otherwise secure the top of the ladder so that the top of the ladder does not slide sideways or fall back off the boat accidentally. If you do not have someone there to hold the base of the ladder

and steady it as you climb or descend, you might consider placing a heavy block at the base of the ladder to prevent the base from kicking out as you get on or off at the top.

- * A common error is placing the ladder at too steep an angle. The best way of telling if you have the ladder sloped correctly is to stand with your arms outstretched and your feet even with the base of the ladder. Your fingertips should just touch the ladder.
- * While moving about on a boat underway, the saying goes, "one hand reserved for the boat." This means that as you move about, always use one hand to hold onto the rail so you don't fall. When using a ladder, this doesn't apply. All four of your limbs must be dedicated to getting you up and down the ladder safely. Do not try to carry anything up the ladder in your hands. Both hands must be free to hold onto the ladder. Use a bucket on a rope to raise and lower tools and supplies to the deck.





- * As your boat sits on blocks in the boatyard, just notice how high the deck is off the ground. That can be a long way to fall if you were to trip or slip while moving about on deck. Dust and debris from sanding and sawing can make decks extremely slick. Snow, ice, rain and even a spot of your own sweat on the deck make for treacherous, slippery conditions. Be extra cognizant of these dangers while working on deck high above the ground.
- * These same trip and slip hazards apply even if your boat is not elevated on blocks in the boat yard. Though the air temperatures are fast increasing, water temperatures will remain in the danger zone for many more weeks. A slip and fall from your boat while at the dock can be rapidly fatal from cold water shock and drowning. Always wear a life jacket (couldn't help mentioning life jackets after all) while working on your boat in its slip until the water temperatures warm up. Know where the closest ladder is to your slip in order to get out of the cold water immediately should you go overboard. Yes, I hate ladders, but this particular ladder could save your life.



Stay safe out there and let's get ready for a wonderful boating season.

If you had the opportunity to read the Winter 2019 edition of The Ensign, you might have noticed the article on providing safe boating data. All members are being encouraged to add an app called SOBOS (Self-Reported On-Water Boat Operator Survey) to their phones. This app will ask recreational boat operators to fill out a short anonymous survey about their cruise. The app will also ask permission for anonymous location captures during a short span of the cruise.

This is a public health service project with a goal of collecting information about regular cruises without incident or accident. The researchers hope to be able to use the data to reduce recreational boating accidents and fatalities through the use of social networking. The data would be compared with local accident data.

Record keeping is minimum in hopes that participation will be encouraged. Visit https://sobos.org for more information.
