





# MORE ABOUT A PREDICTED LOG CONTEST

Here are all of the excuses as to why I shouldn't enter a Predicted Log Contest:

- ★ I don't have a boat.
- ★ I don't know anything about Navigation.
- ★ I just follow the little boat on my chart plotter.
- \* I didn't take Piloting.
- ★ I need the \$20 entry fee to buy fuel.

We don't buy most of those feeble excuses, so let me explain how simple it is. You do need a boat, a stopwatch (your wrist watch), and a selected speed from your GPS. This might be 8.0 kts at 1400 rpm.

All I need to know is how long it will take to get from Green G"11" to Red R"4". So here is the basis for it all: 60D=ST where D= Distance, S= Speed, and T= Time. We want to know T, so T= 60D/S.

Let's try an example: from the chart you find that distance from G"11" to R"4" is 3.0 miles, your boat GPS gave you S as 8.0kts (1400rpm). Therefore, T= 60 (3.0)/8.0= 22.5 or 22 minutes, 30 seconds.

Wasn't that simple? So, now all you have to do is plop down your \$20, on June 22 at about 2pm, start your stopwatch as you head South from G"11", and have a leisurely trip down the South River and back. (As you leave G"11" you must give your observer your predicted time for the trip.) During the trip, if you think the wind or the current is causing your speed to change, you can speed up or slow down. When you come back to the dock, if your actual time is closest to your predicted time, you've just won a lot of money.





#### <u>Safety</u> D/Lt/C Jeff Short, JN-IN

Spring is here! Time to get our boats back in the water and start the boating season. First thing I'm going to do is head back to all the sights and sounds of Annapolis Harbor. If you are thinking the same thing, please consider the challenges facing the captains of the commercial vessels.

How would you like to have to go do your job in the middle of a children's playground? I mean, take your computer, desk and chair and go do your current job while on a playground with dozens of kids running around. Well, I imagine that must be how it feels to run a commercial vessel in Annapolis Harbor or Baltimore's Inner Harbor. Whether it be the tour boats, water taxis, cruise ships,

tugs or tankers, those captains are trying to get their jobs done with a bazillion recreational boaters darting in and out all around them. It's CRAZY out there.

Those commercial captains are on the clock. They are trying to get their payload safely to their destinations. The rest of us are generally out for a joy ride. Yes, we have the same right to be on the water as the commercial boats do, but I ask you to please consider that we are out there for fun, and they are out there trying to make a living.

When I go into Annapolis Harbor or Baltimore's Inner Harbor, my stress level is sky high. In Baltimore's Inner Harbor the stress is due to the larger ships, tugs, and other large commercial vessels that could run me over if I'm not paying attention. In Annapolis, my concern is avoiding the larger commercial vessels such as the tour boats and taxis. But most of all, I worry about running over the dozens of kayaks and stand up paddle boarders that transit the area as if they have a force field around them. They seem oblivious the fact that their lives are in danger. Boats do not have brakes, and can not stop on a dime. Boats can't even turn to avoid them unless they are moving forward and have some way on.

Recreational boating in crowded waterways with commercial traffic is like driving on the highway along with trucks and buses. Those trucks and buses are working. They are making a buck. Nothing I have to do is as important as them getting their job done. They can't stop quickly if you cut in front of them. They cannot turn quickly. When a truck gets into an accident with a car, regardless of who is at fault, the car loses every time.

Therefore, I yield to trucks and buses. I give them a wide berth. I stay out of their blind spot. I give them space to make those WIDE turns at the intersection. And I avoid driving next to trucks and buses on the highway. Have you ever seen a truck tire blow up at 65 mph? The energy in those flying pieces of tire is incredible. It will definitely leave a mark on you and your little car.

I view my boating around commercial vessels in the same light. The best option is to avoid the areas where commercial vessels are working. Let them get their job done safely and with the least amount of effort. Give them room. Anticipate what they are going to do next and stay out of their way. Consider that they are going to have to avoid other recreational boaters as well. Give them extra room to do so.

Do not cross in front of them even if you think you have plenty of time. You do not. It can take a large container ship or tanker up to two miles to stop. Trying to judge the speed of a commercial vessel is fraught with error. Even the speed I see on the AIS is not accurate enough to stake my life on. When I am boating out on the bay, from the time I see a large vessel on the horizon, I consider that it will be on me within 20 minutes and I immediately begin evasive maneuvers.

Stay out of the shipping channel. Most recreational boats have plenty of water outside the shipping channel. Commercial vessels may not. When crossing the shipping channel, cross it perpendicularly so

that you are in the channel for the least amount of time. Consider what happens if your engine dies while in the channel, or if the wind dies while you are sailing across it.

I was out sailing east of the shipping channel on the Chesapeake Bay off Kent Island once when I saw a large tanker heading south approaching the Bay Bridge. I figured I had twenty minutes but I wanted to get to the other side of the channel and head home. I took up a heading so that I could cross the channel perpendicularly in order to get across in the least amount of time. Just as I entered the channel, my steering cables snapped. Thankfully I could continue to go straight ahead. I immediately dropped sails and motored straight across and out of the channel just in time.

Before crossing a channel, consider the current which will likely be stronger in the deeper water of the channel. Consider that some large commercial vessels do NOT stay in the channel. This is particularly common in the southern part of the Bay where tug traffic frequently comes up the western side. Anticipate this.

Most importantly, take a boating class or two. Learn the rules of the road. Know what it means when a boat blows its horn. No, it is not a greeting. Those tour boats do not expect you to stop what you're doing and wave back at them. Those horn sounds mean something. The captain is telling you his intentions. Sadly, she may be the ONLY boat on the water that you know exactly what she is going to do.

Spring is here! Let's get back out there and make boating safer.

### In Search of a Catamaran Noni Rondeau, JN

Buying a used boat need not be stressful and actually can be fun. You may end-up with a dog instead of a cat, but hey, execute your due diligence with a passion and there should be less disappointment! Don't rush the experience, enjoy it.

The first question to ask yourself is how exactly do you intend to use the boat and where. Are you a day-boater or overnighter? If over-night, will you anchor out or be in a marina? Where do Editor's Note: As the story goes, Noni and Phil went on a multistate search for a catamaran, and came home with a new pet rescue dog.

you boat: inland waters, coastal, or off-shore?

Second, establish a budget then add 10%. Every boat is a compromise, so in that first year there will be planned improvements AND that ultimate boat gremlin full of surprises. Plus there will be insurance and dockage.

If you are financing the boat, I strongly suggest you get pre-approved. It is important to know the guidelines for down-payment, age and type of vessel the lender will finance, and terms of the mortgage. You may have your heart set on a catamaran built in the 1980's, which isn't old by mono-hull standards, only to find there is no financing available. Now this becomes a cash purchase. Are you prepared to do this? Buying a boat is a big purchase decision. But, it does not have to be a hole in the water where one dumps money. You can control and minimize the outflow of cash.

I equate buying a yacht to buying real estate, something I know a great deal about. You have a budget, a needs analysis of what you must have and what you would like to have. You've determined how much time, money and sweat equity you are willing to put into your investment. You need to consider condition & brand (much like location with real estate). Brand is obviously a very important factor to consider when thinking about depreciation and resale. As long as new construction costs keep soaring, used boats will depreciate less and a lot more slowly. And just like houses, supply and demand help establish Fair Market Value.

I've been tagged a left-brained person because of my analytical and methodical thinking. In yacht broker terms I'm a spreadsheet type of person, which in my opinion is a good <u>starting point</u>. What is important to me may not be as important to you, but I think we all agree the boat has to move the family safely and comfortably from point A to point B.

My spreadsheet is geared to manufacturer info and the different models. A good source for this is <u>https://sailboatdata.com/</u>. I then researched carefully the differences between construction. I looked for warranty issues with manufacturers. At the onset there were 6 manufacturers ruled out due to price, safety issues and design. Boat shows used to be a great resource, even if looking for used boats. But, not all manufacturers are exhibiting. Then, there are orphan boats (an entirely separate topic).

After compiling a list of possible boats, take to the internet. Look at places like <u>www.yachtworld.com/</u> to see if there are boats in the price range you initially established. Read review articles in the various boat magazines. Look for an owner's forum.

Armed with what you think are the boats of interest, it's time to find a buyer's broker. Choose this person carefully. Is he/she knowledgeable, and do you feel comfortable with this person representing you? This process can be long and arduous, so make sure the team you put together is a good one. Brokers network with their peers and can get insider information about a particular boat. They know the current market.

### <u>Dinner Delights</u> P/Lt/C Georgiana Maszczenski, S

Our April meeting featured Dr. Anson "Tuck" Hines, the director of the Smithsonian Environmental Research Center in Edgewater. Dr. Hines is especially interested in the Maryland blue crab. He shared a wealth of information about them. Here are some of the interesting things about the life of the blue crab that he shared.

• Blue crabs make up 29% of the harvest from the bay.

• Crabs can molt 16 to 20 times as they grow to adulthood.

• We learned a new word – megalops. A megalop is a larval stage in the development of most crabs.

• Crab eggs are released in the ocean down at the mouth of the bay. The tide carries them back into the bay.

• Juvenile crabs stay in shallow waters. Adult crabs stay out in deeper waters. Why? Research has found that 95% of the mortality rate among young crabs is due

to adult crabs eating the younger ones. Yes, they are cannibals! Staying in shallow water protects the young from the adults.

• What do crabs like to eat the most? Clams! 60% of their diet is made up of clams. 15% to 20% of their diet comes from eating smaller crabs.

• Crabs have declined by 80% over the past 12 years. A major part of the problem was overharvesting. 94% of females were being harvested before they could reproduce.

If you missed this meeting, you missed the opportunity spend time with fellow boaters. You also missed the opportunity to learn more about our own Maryland blue crabs. Remember, our meetings offer more than just food. Our speakers always have great things to share. Join us and see for yourself at our next meeting. We look forward to seeing you then.


They are a valuable resource from beginning to end.

We talked with three brokers before choosing one. We then reviewed our spreadsheet with the buyer broker and explained our thought process. He added a boat manufacturer we initially ruled out!

Next, our broker arranged for us to get on some boats. As a result, four additional boats have been ruled out. Choose beds you can sleep in, galleys that function, and living spaces that lend themselves to a higher quality of life experience, both at the dock and underway. These things can only be determined by physically getting on the boat! In case you are wondering, we are still looking but are down to three possible manufacturers. Our broker is our eyes and now previews boats of interest.

Just remember that in yachting, everything is a compromise. Along the way you may need to modify your needs. There is no perfect boat, and the best you can do is seek to find the boat that best suits your needs and agenda in a price point you can afford.

I was born in Spokane, Washington, surrounded by 50 lakes and friends with boats.


