Joel, being a past ASPS Commander, is a great resource who knows how the organization operates and has insight into all the opportunities that are currently available.





<u>Dinner Delights</u> Linda Sweeting

Our October dinner meeting speaker, Robin Heintz Luxenburg, Cruising Guide Publications Manager, came straight from the Powerboat Show. Her presentation, "Maps, Charts & Cruising Guides, Where Do They Come From?," included the latest updates for the Maryland and Virginia Cruising Guides and her company the Williams & Heintz Map Corporation.

Did you know the Williams & Heintz Maryland and Virginia Cruising Guides

are fully functional even when wet? This "wet strength" paper, a 50% cotton blend, is a unique and helpful characteristic of these vital marine printed resources.

The William and Heinz Map Corporation is a family owned company established in 1921. The fourth and current president and CEO, Holly Heinz Budd, holds a BA in Environmental Biology in addition to a MBA. Consequently it is no surprise that all charts are printed with plant-based inks that are watershed safe. They use green materials and sustainable environmental printing processes. One of the first accomplishments, with Holly at the helm, was for William and Heintz to be placed on the Maryland Green Registry and to become ISO certified.

Updated every two years, the 2020-21 Maryland Cruising Guide has forty-nine insets and now also covers the Delaware Bay in addition to the Maryland area of the Chesapeake Bay, the Potomac River as far north as Washington, D.C., the Chincoteague Bay area and a large scale inset of Ocean city. The Virginia Cruising guide has 44 insets and covers Tidewater Virginia, southern Chesapeake Bay, the Potomac River and Atlantic Ocean shores including a full page enlargement of Ocean City and Chincoteague Island. Both guides list marinas and their amenities, along with boater safety tips, emergency numbers, illustrations detailing what navigational aides look like on a chart page, twelve tidal current charts spanning 2020 to 2022. Of special interest is the planning chart, each box in the grid is 5 nm square which makes it easy to determine distances between points. Additionally QR codes have been included which will link your smart phone or other interactive web enabled device to updated online maps and other information. The QR codes are updated every Thursday and will expire December 31, 2021.

The Maryland Cruising guide was not available for purchase at our dinner meeting; but Robin will extend the "case price" advantage to any ASPS member who visits her booth to purchase a Cruising Guide at the Boat Show.

The William and Heinz Corporation is also a NOAA authorized map "on demand" printer. All official NOAA charts printed are corrected with Notices to Mariners up to the week of purchase. This versatile company can also print specialized maps sized anywhere from 3" x 5" to 47 1/4" x 63". They have the largest map folder in the United States, and perhaps the world, which can fold 16 parallel accordion folds up to 44 inches wide.

If you are ever on the West River, check their Maryland Cruising Guide carefully to find their Bed and Breakfast. Five boats can be accommodated and they even have their own unicorn.

Robin provided interesting presentation and shared many interesting anecdotes; most telling was the one about the high end GPS vendor she met at the Virginia boat show a few years ago. He had become tired of customers calling for directions at all hours because their GPS had stopped working. He purchased two cases of charts now provides free charts with every GPS purchased.





Safety D/Lt/C Jeff Short, JN-IN

I have a couple of very important things for you to do as soon as possible in order to keep safe and well for years to come. For once (and maybe only just this once) I will not be harping about wearing a life jacket or staying off ladders, although that advice is still sound.

Rather, I want to emphasis the importance of keeping your vaccinations up to date and most importantly, getting your flu shot ASAP. The flu kills an average of 35,000 people in the US annually. Getting the flu shot can prevent the majority of people from catching the flu. Those that do will get much less sick than they would have had they not had the shot. Some flu years are worse

than others in both severity of the flu and effectiveness of the flu shot. But it is always to your benefit to protect yourself by getting the vaccination. It takes about two weeks for the vaccine to impart maximum protective effects, so get it early. As of 15 Oct 2019 there are ALREADY an astonishing amount of serious flu cases in Maryland.

There are very few contraindications to getting the flu shot and very few allergies to it. While you are at it, specifically ask your doctor if you are up to date on all the other preventive vaccinations. Be absolutely sure that you are current on your pneumonia vaccine! Do not blow this off. This vaccine series protects against particularly vicious strains of pneumonia that can be rapidly fatal.

I encourage you to consider asking about getting the shingles vaccine. The virus that causes shingles lives in most of us our whole lives, particularly those of us who had chickenpox as a kid. Stress, illness and other events can cause the virus to emerge as a very painful, red rash known as shingles. Most of us know someone who has suffered from shingles. Believe me, you do not want to pass up this vaccine. The shingles vaccine can prevent or reduce the symptoms of shingles even in those who have had shingles already.


Lastly be sure that your tetanus immunization status is up to date.

And don't forget to wear your life jacket and stay off ladders!


