

<u>https://bit.ly/2EiAnVS</u>. It's a virtual safety check offered by the United States Coast Guard Auxiliary. It will give you a starting point to think about what you need to do later on.

When things open up again, our team of qualified Vessel Safety Check examiners, led this year by P/C Kathy Nash, AP-IN, will be ready to inspect your boat at your convenience. When it becomes possible, please pass the word to your boating friends that ASPS offers this valuable service. Keep the VSC ad in this issue for contact information. When appropriate, contact Kathy to set up your appointment. The VSC will ensure that your boat meets all federal, state, and local safety equipment requirements. You will certainly get information about equipment that needs replacing or would be a good addition to your boat. Once you see how valuable this service is, you might even want to consider volunteering to become a VSC examiner.

Usually, I would end this article with a request that you consider volunteering for the upcoming boat shows. But, this is not a normal year. When you check the website for the Annapolis Boat Shows, you will see that they have put a hold on both the Bay Bridge Boat Show and the Annapolis Sailboat Show – both held in April. They plan to make a decision no later than 2 April. This date is beyond the publication date for the Anchor Watch. Email will be sent out when we have further information.

Be aware that this is not your only opportunity to work at a boat show. We have a presence at several boat shows during the year. And, we volunteer to help other squadrons at other boat shows. Since you might not be able volunteer for this one, think about talking to me about the future boat shows. Manning our booth at boat shows is an important job. Your service can lead to new members as well as spreading information about what we do. You get free admission to the show, allowing you to shop for replacement equipment and new gadgets you learned about when having a VSC.

I hope to see everyone out on the water. We want it to be a great year with lots of activities. We've planned for them. We're hoping to get out there − sooner rather than later. ■

Kent Narrows said, "Our first priority is always the safety of our members." So, we will stay at home. Hopefully, it will give us all more time to plan our summer boating adventures!



Finally- just a reminder. The success of our events rests in the hands of volunteers. Susan and I need your help. Contact us, and show up to help make an event a great success!






Try a **Becket Hitch** - a relative of the Sheet Bend. It is just a Sheet Bend on a line with a loop at the end.

Safety D/C Jeff Short, JN-IN

Social distancing! Runs on hand sanitizer and toilet paper! Mass panic across the nation and the world! What is going on around here?

Novel corona virus disease for 2019 (nCoViD19) is a pandemic that is causing chaos affecting every part of our lives, mentally, physically, emotionally, socially and financially. But why?

In the March 2019 issue of Anchor Watch (Doorknobs Can Kill You!) I wrote about tips to avoid getting sick from communicable diseases. Last month, Feb 2020 (Do You Feel Lucky?), I wrote about risk and consequence; why people

are comfortable gambling money away at a casino with the odds stacked against them, yet we are also comfortable with the risk knowing the consequences of falling overboard and drowning while boating. Therefore, we don't wear life jackets when we know we should. Both of these articles are helpful when discussing the current situation with nCOVID19.

The influenza virus kills 30-50,000 people in the US each year. In 2017-18, influenza killed 80,000 in the US alone. This year, to date, influenza has killed 16,000 people in the US. Yet every year it is a struggle to convince Americans to get their flu shots, wash their hands, cough into their elbows and keep their hands away from their faces. These methods are all a sure bet to help prevent catching communicable diseases such as the deadly influenza virus. Mass media barely gives influenza a second thought.

Compare this to nCOVID19, which over the same time frame this year, has killed less than 10,000 world wide and less than 200 people in the US. (These numbers will be higher when you read this.) Yet because of this disease, the country is in emotional and financial turmoil. It is all the media talks about. The stock market is in a seizure. Schools, malls, and restaurants are closed across the country for an unknown period. All sporting events, conferences and movie theaters are closed. We can't even go to the gym to blow off steam. What is going on around here?

The answer is UNCERTAINTY. NCOVID19 is a "novel" virus, meaning that it has not previously been identified in humans. Scientists have very little information on how it spreads or how it affects humans. There is no vaccine to prevent it and no treatment available. We are learning as we go and that is not a comforting feeling for anybody. This uncertainty is causing mayhem in all aspects of society.

We may know that influenza is deadly and we know that it will come through every year. But we also know that we could get the flu shot if we wanted to. We know that we could avoid touching doorknobs and railings or wash our hands if we do. We know we should keep our hands away from our faces. We might even criticize the flu shot if we happen get a minor case of the flu even though we got the vaccine. Nowadays, we expect perfection with the disease we know about (even though developing a flu vaccine is largely a prediction.) Yet we may choose not to do any of those preventive measures because we just feel lucky. "It won't affect me." It's much like not wearing a lifejacket when boating even though we know there is a major consequence of drowning. "It won't happen to me."

But with nCOVID19, we don't yet know the risk or consequences. So as a society, we are frightened and panicked.

On an individual level, we are also frightened and panicked because of uncertainly. So far, what we have learned about nCOVID19 is that it spreads easily person to person. It is terrifying to know that a person can be infected and spreading the disease for several days before they become symptomatic. With the flu, if a co-worker comes to work with a cough, we send them home to self-isolation before we have a chance



to catch it. With nCOVID19, by the time your co-worker develops a cough at the office, you have already been exposed.

We also know that the majority of those infected, 80% or so, have minor symptoms (cough, brief fever, nausea, diarrhea) or no symptoms at all. These people can spread the disease unknowingly as well. How can we possibly protect ourselves if we don't even know who to avoid? The uncertainty of NOT KNOWING the risk is just so stressful. So what can we do?

The bottom line is this, since we have no cure, no treatment and no preventive vaccine, we must stop the pandemic by denying the virus new hosts. By avoiding catching the disease, individually, we can collectively snuff out the virus. We can do our part by STAYING HOME.

NCOVID19 spreads mainly though airborne droplets exhaled, coughed or sneezed from an infected person. Those droplets can easily travel 6 feet before falling out of the air. Some droplets can remain airborne for 30 minutes or more. If you breathe them in, you will get infected. That is why social distancing, coughing into your elbow, and self-quarantine and isolation are recommended. Stay home!

Droplets containing the virus fall out of the air and can survive for a time on whatever surface they land on. There is some evidence that corona virus can last for days on plastic or metal surfaces. That is why it is critical to avoid touching doorknobs, railings, shopping carts, keyboards, and phones. Be vigilant to wash those commonly touched surfaces with disinfectant to kill the viruses present. If you happen to touch a contaminated surface and then touch your mouth, nose or eyes, you have just completed the transfer of virus to a new host.

Conscientiously try not to touch your face for 5 minutes. I bet you can't do it. That is why it is recommended that you constantly wash your hands for at least 20 seconds, or two verses of the Happy Birthday song. In the absence of soap and water, alcohol hand sanitizer should be used frequently. It must contain at least 60% alcohol in order to kill the corona virus. You should use enough to get your hands visibly wet. It is critical that you leave the hand sanitizer on your hands long enough to dry. Alcohol requires that "contact time" to kill the virus.

NCOVID19 is spreading rapidly around the country. New cases are growing exponentially. We have a very small window of time to stop the spread and snuff out the disease altogether. Next week may be too late. We must ALL act now, everyone, at the same time. STAY HOME! The sooner we break this pandemic, the sooner we can get back out on the water.







