





America's Boating Course

Materials: Printed Text and Certificate upon passing test with an 80%.

Passing this introductory course to boating can qualify a person born after July 1972 to legally operate a recreational vessel in Maryland. This is the perfect course to learn or review boating safety (if you don't need the card) and Maryland laws for boating. The course is 8 hours of instruction with a test at the end. Passing the test with an 80% or better entitles you to your Maryland Boating Safety Education Certificate.

Marine Navigation (aka, Piloting)

ASPS VSCs: 2019 Year End Report P/C Kathy Nash, AP-IN **ASPS Vessel Safety Check Chair**

The ASPS Vessel Safety Examiners had a successful 2019. Ten examiners completed 211 Vessel Safety Checks over the past year. With the help of our squadron members, our goal is to significantly increase that number in 2020. You can make that happen.

Of the 211 VSCs we completed, only 182 (about 88%) of them passed and were rewarded a VSC decal for their vessel. Fortunately, many owners of vessels that

didn't pass often corrected the identified issues quickly, often within 24hrs. Then they would invite us back for a re-examination, allowing us to issue them a VSC decal. It was very rewarding knowing we made many vessels legal and safer.

Let's examine why some vessels didn't pass. Some of the most common issues included:

• Visual Distress Signals being out of date. Recreational vessels 16-feet and over (and boats less than 16feet operating at night) are required to carry USCG approved signaling devices that are current and not beyond their expiration date.

• Navigation Lights not working, or not properly configured. All vessels must be able to display USCG approved navigation lights between sunset and sunrise and in conditions of reduced visibility.

• Registration and Documentation papers must always be aboard and available. There are detailed requirements for display of state stickers and numbers. Federally documented vessels have several additional requirements. Vessel owners don't always know or completely understand these regulations.

• Sound Producing Devices inoperable. To comply with Navigation Rules and for distress signaling purposes, all vessels must carry an operational sound producing device that complies with USCG standards.

• Marine Sanitation Devices not properly locked. Any installed toilet must be an unmodified USCG approved device. Overboard discharge outlets must be locked. Federal and State laws prohibit untreated sewage discharged in Inland waters or within 3 nautical miles from the shore in coastal waters. Maryland is very strict on this requirement and can issue fines up to \$2,000 for violations.

• Ventilation Systems inoperable. Vessels with gasoline engines in closed compartments must have an operational powered ventilation system that adheres to USCG standards. We are very thankful when we discover an inoperable Ventilation System, due to the potential risk of explosion and fire.

• Personal Flotation Devices (PFDs): PFDs (also known as Life Jackets) must be USCG approved and in good condition. Vessels 16-feet and over must also have one Type IV (throwable) device immediately available for deployment.

All VSCs also include briefings on safe operation, proper training, and recommended non-required safety equipment that all responsible vessel owners and operators should consider. Among the subjects addressed includes; Boating Safety Classes, Marine Radios, Nautical Charts, Fuel Management, Accident Reporting requirements, Survival Tips, First Aid Kits, and Float Plans. We attempt to answer any questions asked. If we don't know the answer, we always follow-up with verified information.

The best way for someone to prepare for a successful Vessel Safety Check is to visit the Virtual VSC web page (https://bit.ly/2EiAnVS) and complete a self-examination on all your vessels. Then schedule a VSC by an ASPS examiner by using my contact information shown on the next page.



One of the highlights for 2019 was the addition of a new ASPS Vessel Safety Examiner. 1st/Lt Patrick McGeehan, P, studied the VSE manual and passed the required written test. Then, he completed the required five supervised VSCs to become fully VSE qualified. After that, he completed several VSCs on his own before the season ended. Please join me in congratulating Patrick, and all the ASPS Vessel Safety Examiners for a job well done in 2019!

VESSEL SAFETY CHECK

We are always looking for and need additional Vessel Safety Examiners. You don't need to be an expert on engines, electronics, marine architecture, etc. We

teach you everything you need to know. It's very rewarding, plus you get to see some beautiful vessels and meet some great people. If you have any interest in joining our team or have any questions about becoming a Vessel Safety Examiner, please contact me via my contact information shown below.

We checked a wide diversity of vessels over the past year; anything from kayaks, 8-foot dinghies, Flemings and 58-foot Kadey-Krogen trawler yachts. We do all vessels under 65 feet. Many of our VSCs are performed at per-scheduled events that occur yearly at Yacht Clubs and various Marinas. Our Squadron has a good reputation for having excellent Vessel Safety Examiners and performing very thorough Vessel Safety Checks.

Free courtesy Vessel Safety Checks cover safety equipment carried or installed on a vessel, and certain aspects of the vessel's condition. If the vessel meets or exceeds all requirements, the examiner will award the owner or operator a decal current for that year. VSCs decals expire at year's end, so vessels should be checked every year.

If a vessel doesn't pass their Vessel Safety Check, we are prohibited from notifying or reporting anything to authorities. If safety gear needs to be purchased to pass, we provide coupons for 10% discount at West Marine. There is no down side for having a VSC. It's a win-win endeavor for everyone that leaves vessel owners and operators knowing their vessel is safe, and meets Federal and State requirements



<u>Safety</u> D/Lt/C Jeff Short, JN-IN

I was walking out to check the mail the other day, and it came to me that one of the most dangerous places you can go this winter might be to your own mailbox. It had rained a bit, and the temperature had dropped to near freezing. Though I could not be sure, I suspected that my path to the mailbox could be slippery. In the winter, the act of simply walking to the mailbox can be very dangerous.

I consider myself an expert on safe winter walking. I have worked many shifts in a tiny emergency room in the Alaska Bush, most of it in the dead of winter, and I always walked to and from

the hospital. The route is on unimproved dirt roads and tundra (up hill both ways of course!) In good weather it takes about 30 minutes. But when it is icy, the short walk is nerve wracking and downright dangerous. I know what kind of cases I will see in the emergency room as soon as I walk out the door and slip on the ice. During an Alaska winter, cold fronts come through at a remarkable pace. Frequently, they start with rain and finish with sudden drops in temperature, effectively flash freezing a coat of clear, slick ice on everything. Though beautiful to look at, the ice coating makes steps, walkways and roads unmanageable. How best do we remain safe while simply walking during the cold months of winter?





For walking in the winter, when there is a possibility of snow, ice or slippery surfaces, the single most important thing you can do for your safety is to wear appropriate footgear. Lace up boots or shoes with grippy rubber or neoprene composite soles are best. They should be laced up tight to prevent your feet from sliding around inside the shoe. Slip-on foul weather sailing boots, or shoes with slick leather or plastic soles are not safe in icy conditions. In my experience working in emergency rooms across the country, the most dangerous place to go in icy or slippery conditions seems to be the mailbox. I don't know how many times

I have been told, as I was setting a fractured arm or suturing a lacerated forehead, "I was just going to check the mailbox. It was only going to take a second so I threw on my bedroom slippers."

When walking in slippery conditions, dedicate yourself to safely getting to your destination. Put away the cell phone. Do not carry anything in you arms. Use a backpack to carry stuff in order to keep your arms free. Keep your hands out of your pockets. You may need them for balance or to break a fall. Best to fall on an outstretched arm than to land on your head.

Adopt a posture slightly bent forward at the waist. Keep your stance wide, feet about shoulder width apart with your knees slightly bent. Keep your arms slightly out from your sides. This is an athlete's stance and will help to keep you stable and maintain balance if one foot should slip. You should look much like a baseball shortstop or football linebacker ready for action. On slippery surfaces, avoid walking heel-toe as you normally would. Instead, use more of a shuffling, slow, purposeful gait keeping your feet flat. This will increase your contact with the ground. Keep your body weight directly over the foot in full contact with the ground as you walk. When negotiating stairs, use hand rails if available. (But remember that hand rails are loaded with germs so wash your hands when done.)

Before getting out of your car, open the door and look down at the ground you are about to step on. Look for ice or slick spots and consider moving your car to a better location to step out. When walking in proximity to traffic, be sure that your scarf and hat do not muffle sounds. I found that my favorite, warm, Alaska hat muffled sounds so much that I could not hear the snow machines (skidoos) speeding up behind me on the road. Consider wearing gloves or mittens to protect your hands in case you need them to break a fall. You do not want to be in a hurry when walking in slippery conditions so give yourself plenty of extra time. My 30 minute walk often took 45 minute or an hour when the conditions were treacherous. I planned that time into my commute in order to be sure that I made it to work safely and on time.




If you plan to do a lot of walking in icy conditions, consider getting a pair of Yak-trax or ice cleats to slip onto the soles of your walking boots. I used my set when the roads were covered with thick glare-ice and they made the walk much less stressful.
