Commander's Message

By the time that you are reading this, all the vendors and boats of the 2021 Annapolis Boat Shows will be gone. Based on my observations while manning the ASPS booth, it appears that the show was a success. For example, while on breaks from the booth, I wanted to take a closer look at some of the sailboats, but I didn't want to wait in the long lines waiting to board the boats that I was interested in. I will try again next year during non-peak times. Many people from other squadrons across the country stopped by our booth wondering how our squadron was doing with membership, courses and other activities while sharing tidbits of information about their squadrons. There seemed to be a good number of people getting into

boating for the first time that were curious about our courses, and a few people signed up for further contact. Time will tell if this event translates into additional members for ASPS.

As far as I can tell, there wasn't any king tide (nuisance) flooding in the city dock area during the boat shows as there was in 2019. We were lucky this time, but nuisance flooding will continue to worsen in the city dock

area. The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) issued a technical report in 2014 that showed Annapolis as experiencing the greatest increase in average annual nuisance flooding of any U.S. city. The Union of Concerned Scientists predicted that Annapolis will experience as many as 200 annual flood days by 2030 and 350 annual flood days by 2040. The planned renovation of the city dock area can't come soon enough and will hopefully mitigate the effects of nuisance flooding.

Fourteen people attended the **AIS** (Automated Identification System) seminar. We had an informative presentation and discussion of AIS lead by Cptn. Priscilla Travis. AIS is a technology that identifies marine traffic information and has moved from commercial to the recreational world.

We moved the **America Boating Course** back to November on Wednesdays. If you were born after July, 1972 you need the Boating Safety Course card to legally operate a recreational vessel. If you already have your card or were born before July 1972, it is the perfect review of basic boating and safety. Please sign

How to Use a Chart is the next seminar. and is a great review of Chart No.1. Captain Priscilla Travis will walk you through this important document for navigation, don't miss it.





Visual Distress Signals 1st/Lt Terry Slattery, Safety Officer

Most vessels are required to carry visual distress signaling devices by US Coast Guard regulations. You must have three day signals and three night signals. Three dual-purpose day/night signals are sufficient to meet the requirements, but are insufficient for a true emergency.

Daytime signals include: smoke, flag, mirror, red handheld flare, red meteor or parachute flare (fired from a gun or launcher).

Night time signals include: red handheld flare, red meteor or parachute flare, approved electric

distress light. Pyrotechnic devices must be less than 42 months old from the date of manufacture, indicated by the expiration date printed on them.

Electric distress lights have become popular in the last few years since they don't contain hazardous materials and don't have an expiration date. However, there are some stipulations on their use:

- the light is only valid for night time use,
- the batteries must not be expired and the light must work, and
- a day-time distress signal like an orange flag or three smoke devices must be paired with the light.

While a distress light technically replaces the need to carry pyrotechnic devices, it is prudent to carry multiple types of signals for different scenarios.

Flare Lifetimes

It's a good idea to keep recently expired flares on board as they will typically work even though they don't qualify for the USCG requirements. We've seen a good success rate of flares and meteors that are up to ten years old at our flare shoot training sessions. We've noted a reduction in intensity and successful operation of flares older than ten years, so don't bet your life on the much older flares.

Match the Distress Signal With the Situation

It is important to select the right type of signaling device for the time of day and the type of notification that you need. A flag or smoke won't be visible at night, just as the electric signal won't be very visible during the day. During twilight you may have to use both types of signals.

You'll likely need to use some form of alerting signal at the start of an emergency and switch to a location signal after you've attracted attention. For alerting, use meteor or parachute flares. The





meteors are short duration so you'll need to fire two or three in succession because observers may only get a glimpse of the first flare and not believe their eyes. The second and third flares confirm your distress and provides the observers a better indication of your location. Additional meteor flares allows you to follow up the initial signal with additional signaling every five or ten minutes.

Location signals allow emergency responders to zero in on your location once they are in the area. The red handheld flare, smoke, or orange flag should be used in this situation, depending on whether it is day or night. Smoke canisters are particularly useful because they don't have to be handheld, freeing you to do other things.

You should also consider the surrounding environment when you select a signaling device. If the waterway is busy, like the upper and middle Chesapeake Bay in the summer, the location signals are critical for emergency responders to pick out your vessel from a busy background.


Expired Flare Disposal

The 42 month lifetime of pyrotechnic devices means that you'll collect a variety of signaling devices over time. The chemicals in these devices make them hazardous material that shouldn't go into landfills where they contaminate the local water systems. Some fire and police departments will accept them – check with your local organizations. Household hazardous materials drop-off days may be a way to dispose of some devices (Anne Arundel county will accept handheld flares; no meteor or parachute flares.)

Flare Practice Sessions

Hands-on experience with flares of various sorts is valuable and many boating organizations hold periodic classes. These organizations do a thorough preparation, including approval and notification of safety authorities, notify local businesses where signals may be seen, providing safety equipment, and handling the disposal of spent and dud flares. You can often bring your old flares to contribute to the training program – a great way to dispose of your old signaling devices.

You get to see how most of the hand held flares are ignited and how to hold them to protect yourself and your vessel from the smoke and hot slag that they produce. Equally valuable is the experience of firing a meteor or parachute flare. Some events may include the use of signal mirrors and fire extinguishers. Don't pass up the opportunity to participate in these events.

October Dinner Delights

It is so nice to feel ourselves getting back into the routine of our monthly dinner meetings. Attendees at our October meeting were happy to be together. The Elks Lodge is doing a great job of helping us socially distance by spacing tables apart and only seating 6 at each table. As always, the food was delicious.

Our guest speaker was David Gendell. Mr. Gendell grew up in the Annapolis area, and has always enjoyed sailing on the Chesapeake Bay. He is the cofounder of *Spinsheet*, our own local magazine all about sailing on the bay. He

is also a U.S. Coast Guard-licensed captain, a racing sailor, and enjoys fishing. His latest accomplishment is the book, <u>Thomas Point Shoal Lighthouse: A Chesapeake Bay Icon</u>. His talk centered on the fascinating history of this local landmark.

In case you missed this meeting, here are some of the facts and ideas he shared:

- All the music loving sailors in our group were thrilled to learn that David Gendell had the opportunity to help lead the tour of Thomas Point Shoal Lighthouse for Jimmy Buffett. The musician used the opportunity to record a song to be shown in an upcoming video release.
- The lighthouse became automated in 1986.
- The lighthouse at Thomas Point was needed because Baltimore became an important port early on. As the farthest north, it was closest to Chicago as well as the farms in Pennsylvania. In fact, Baltimore was the second most popular city in America in the 1800s.
- Due to the constricted travel area near Annapolis, Baltimore asked the U.S. government for a light at the end of Thomas Point Shoal in 1825.
- The first light was a 30 foot tall tower on the point itself. It was difficult to see, and it was built on eroding ground. It only lasted about 10 years.
- The Fresnel lens used originally in the lighthouse was actually created in France.
- The screwpile lighthouse design actually came from English designs.
- The Thomas Point Shoal Lighthouse was actually built in Baltimore to be assembled on the site.
- A massive ice floe in 1877 did major damage to lighthouses on the bay. The cottage at Hooper's Strait actually broke off and floated away with the keepers onboard!
- The Thomas Point Shoal Lighthouse is managed and preserved by the Annapolis Maritime Museum, the City of Annapolis, and the Chesapeake Chapter of the U.S. Lighthouse Society.

If you were unable to attend this meeting, you missed interesting information about the Thomas Point Shoal Lighthouse as well as an opportunity to spend time with fellow boaters. Once again, we are able to offer dinner meetings that give you the opportunity to spend time with like-minded people. We also always offer an informative speaker, so you can learn something interesting about boating on the Chesapeake Bay. Join us at our next meeting. We are so happy that we can look forward to seeing you again!
