Commander's Message

Editor's Note: Boating gives all of us the opportunity to continue learning! Continue reading to find how our commander learned some new lessons on a recent boat cruise.

I learned a valuable lesson when Debbie and I recently sailed to Tolchester Marina in Chestertown, MD. We chose that marina because it is less than a mile from the vacation house that my daughter and her family had rented. Debbie has a leg prosthetic, and never had any problem getting off our boat at other marinas that we have visited in the bay. Those marinas have fixed docks. Most of the time, the

distance from the dock to the deck of our Beneteau 361 is manageable for Debbie to step up or down with the use of a one or two step dock stair or folding step ladder placed on the dock.

When we arrived at our slip at Tolchester Marina, it was immediately apparent to me that the distance from the dock to the boat deck was much greater because it was a floating dock. The folding step ladder wasn't going to work for this situation. What was I going to do? Debbie couldn't get off the boat. I decided to look for a suitable dock step with railing among the neighboring boats. I found one not too far away at a boat that didn't seem to be occupied. I untied the dock step with the intent of borrowing it for a short time for Debbie to get off the boat, and back on later, so that we could enjoy some activities with my daughter's family.

Soon after we arrived back later at our boat, a very angry boater approached me accusing me of stealing his dock step. Apparently, he was on his boat when I borrowed the dock step. I tried to explain that I had borrowed it because that was the only way Debbie could get off the boat. Of course, he wasn't going to accept my explanation, and the situation escalated to the marina management who paid a visit to me. They understood my situation as well as the situation of the angry boater who they had to calm down.

Summer is almost gone, time for fall boating and taking courses to strengthen your boating knowledge. This fall's schedule will be offered over Zoom, so remember, there is no commute. ABC for your Boating Safety Card is being offered in five sessions. The new Marine Navigation course is replacing Piloting. The course will start off with electronic navigation systems and then do paper charting. Coastal and Inland navigation are covered. The new format will have you practicing navigation with both paper and electronic charts. We will also have several seminars, please spread the word and sign up early!

Course: ABCIII Boating Safety course

Dates: Tuesdays, 5 October to 2 November, 2021

Double Sheet Bend

This is a sheet bend with an extra wrap before it is tightened. It is recommended for tying polypropylene cord. Preferred over the sheet bend, it will take a heavier load, it will not slip, and it is easier to untie than a sheet bend. It is the best knot for joining two lines of unequal thickness.

Storm Planning - Before It Happens

We're entering the 2021 east coast storm season and it makes sense to think about plans that can help keep our boats and ourselves safe.

Have a Plan

The first and foremost element is to actually have a plan. It isn't sufficient to begin planning the week before a named storm is going to hit your area. What actions are you going to take? What supplies will you need? How long will it take to implement your plan? Do you have a backup plan in case a critical element of your primary

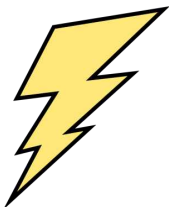
plan is a no-go? You should consider that predictions are not always accurate and that the wind and water may be higher than anticipated.

A crucial part of your plan should be obtaining the supplies you need. Longer dock lines and chafe protection equipment will be impossible to find as a storm approaches. If you plan to haul out, are you on the chosen marina's storm schedule?

Will you have time to implement your plan? A plan is no good if you require several days of preparation but you can't get to the boat due to other commitments. Develop a simpler plan.

Staying In the Water

One option is to keep your boat in the water. If your boat is on a mooring, you should really consider a different plan. In a slip, is there room, and do you have strong lines that are long enough to properly tie up for the anticipated surge?



It isn't wise to plan to adjust lines during the middle of the storm. The surge predictions may be low and you find that the 3-4 ft surge that you planned to wade through has turned into a 6 ft surge that's over your head. Lightning is common, which carries the threat of electrocution if a strike happens nearby while you're in the water. Speaking of electrical, turn off the power to your dock or find out if the marina will turn off the power. Avoid a dock that has energized outlets under water.

If your boat is normally on a lift, take it off. It won't take much storm surge to float off the lift. If you have no other alternatives, drop the lift and tie the boat as well as you can for the expected surge. Similarly, consider the air draft of your boat if you keep it in covered storage. Will a storm surge force your boat into the covered roof?

An alternative to your slip is to move the boat to a storm anchorage. The good spots are well known, so you shouldn't necessarily depend on that nice looking spot to be available when you show up.

Haul Out

The safest plan is to get your boat hauled out in a marina that won't be inundated by storm surge. Trailerable boats should be put on a trailer and moved to a location that won't be subject to storm surge and wind damage.

Marinas should use pads under jackstands so that torrential rains won't allow the jackstands to sink into the ground, even if there is a gravel base. Jackstands should be chained together so that they won't shift out from under the boat as the wind builds. Marinas may also strap down boats to tie points sunk into the ground to keep boats from blowing over in high winds.



Final Words

Read up on storm preparation for your type of boat and plan accordingly. Regardless of your plan and location, plan to remove all items that create windage. Sailboats should remove sails and all exterior cloth. Powerboats should store the bimini top and lower its frame.

Finally, think twice about taking any action in the midst of a major storm. Regardless of your planning, you must choose what is more valuable: your boat or your life.

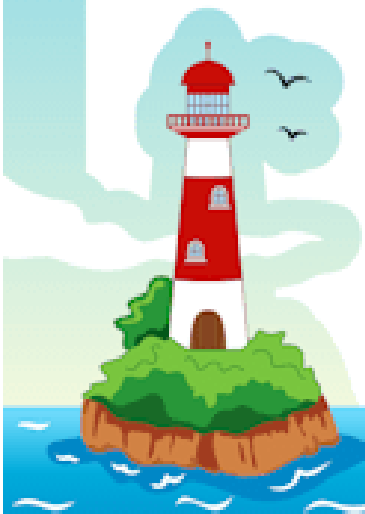

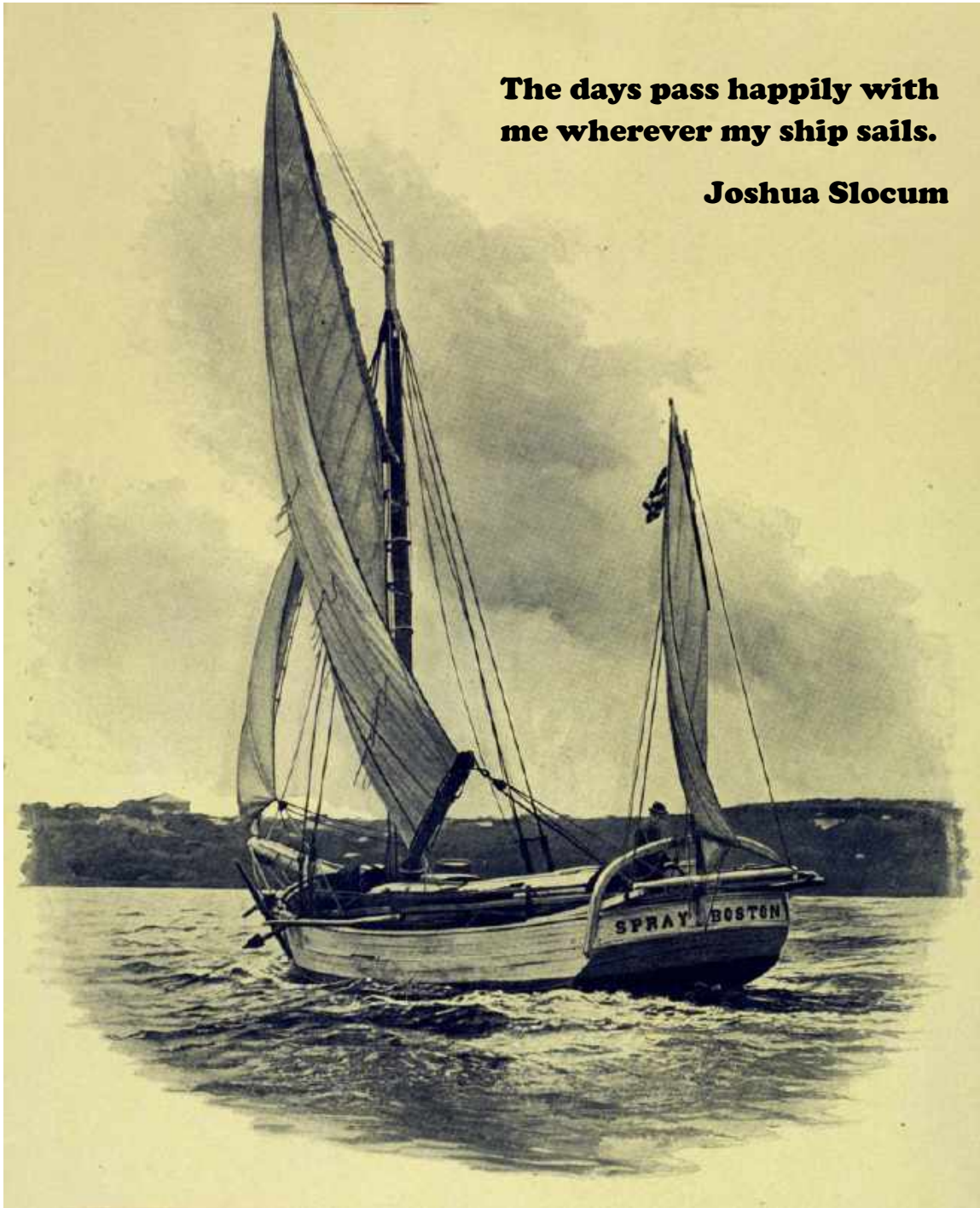

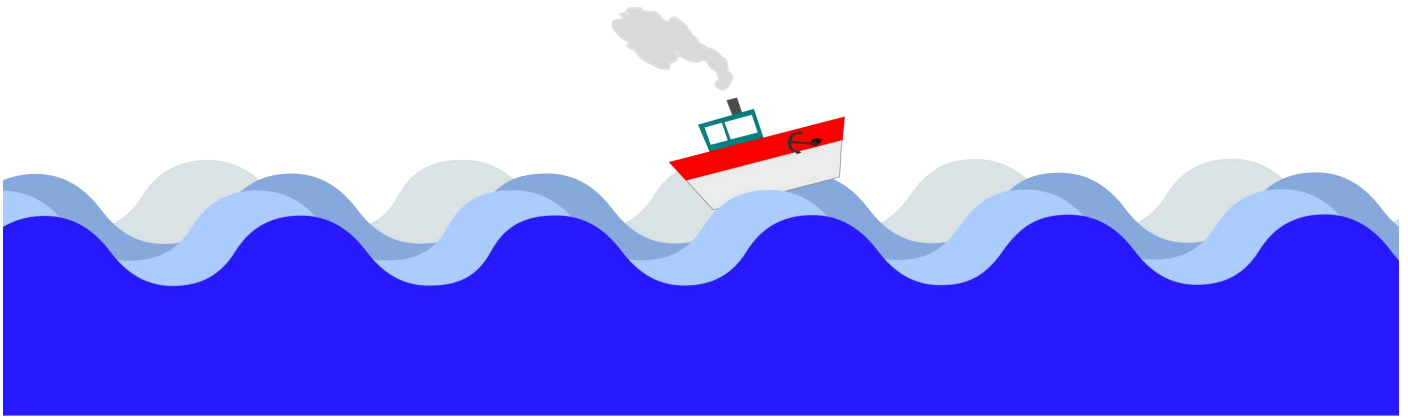
