Marine Navigation is the first of the navigational classes focusing on techniques for piloting a boat in coastal and inland conditions. The course emphasizes planning and checking along with the use of GPS



and other electronic systems for determining position, and introduces digital charting along with traditional charting, compass and dead reckoning skills. Plotting, use of the compass, aids to navigation, electronic tools and a host of related topics are included in this all-new approach to coastal, inland and river piloting. This course uses the Bowditch Bay practice chart and local charts, the USPS 4"X15" plotter and dividers. Computer with OpenCPN must be student provided.

The Student Kit includes the Student Manual, the Plotting and Labeling Standards Learning Guide and instructions for downloading, installing and using OpenCPN. It is a free, marine navigation program that is state-of-the-art and in wide use by commercial and recreational boating enthusiasts. OpenCPN runs on a variety of environments, including Windows, Android tablets and phones, and MAC OS, but not iPhones or iPads. (The larger screens of desktop or laptop computers work best.)

America's Boating Clubs offers the America's Boating Course III to fill that requirement. The course is 8 hours of instruction and a test. Passing the test with an 80% or better gets you the Boating Safety card.

The class is going to be a live course at the Bay Ridge Marina community center. Attendance for both days is required.

Dinner Delights

If you missed our October dinner meeting, you missed a great presentation by Kristina Motley. She is the Senior Environmental Specialist at the Maryland Environmental Service on behalf of the Maryland Port Administration. Yes, it is quite the title, but the job is even more interesting when you realize that she works on Poplar Island. Kristina gave us background information as well as a current update on the state of the Poplar Island project. Here



are just a few of the facts that she shared:

- In 1996, less than 5 acres remained of the 1,140 acres making up Poplar Island when it was documented in 1847.
- The project receives about 2 million cubic yards of dredged materials a year.
- The finished project will have about 776 acres of tidal wetlands, about 829 acres of upland habitat, and about 110 acres of open water in a manmade bay.
- The island currently hosts over 250 different species of birds.
- Poplar Island has become an important nesting habitat for a wide range of wildlife.
- Poplar Island has become a registered monarch butterfly migration habitat. Over 2,000 monarch butterflies have been tagged there since 2019.
- One of the more popular and successful programs has been the Terrapin Education and Research Partnership. Classrooms around Maryland are given the opportunity to raise terrapin hatchlings for a year. As a result of this controlled environment, the terrapins grow to the size of a 3 to 5 year old wild terrapin. This gives them a great survival advantage when the students bring them back to Poplar Island for release.
- Over 2,800 terrapins have been raised and released since 2005.

Vessel Crossing Situations Lord of the Electrons, Terry Slattery, Safety Officer

The call went out on Ch 16: "Southbound sailboat north of the Bay Bridge about to cross the ship channel, this is the southbound car carrier BigShip." They arranged to switch to Ch 13 to discuss the crossing situation. Both vessels held their course and speed and the sailboat safely made it across the channel with perhaps a mile of separation. However, the small vessel was under sail and could have been in trouble if the wind changed. We've seen closer situations out on the water. It happens regularly, judging by the frequent sound signals of five short blasts that we hear at our house.

Why do small vessels cross in front of large vessels? Fishermen and sailboat racers are particularly prone to "I can make it across" in front of a ship. What they often misjudge is the ship's speed, relative to theirs. The small vessel operator also doesn't take into account that in close proximity to the Bay Bridge, a ship doesn't have any options for avoiding a collision. The choice is basically one of "run over the small vessel versus hit the Bay Bridge." It's clear, at least to me, which option that big ship is going to take and that's to hold course within the channel.

Can't the ship simply stop? These behemoths can't stop very quickly. A fully loaded ship running at 15 or 20 knots will take a mile or more to stop at full emergency reverse power. That's not enough to avoid the small vessel.

Then there's the limited visibility from a ship's bridge, especially those that are built with the bridge located amidships or aft. The diagram below from BoatUS shows how far out the typical cargo ship can see and how long it takes to travel that distance. (See <u>https://boatus.org/findings/10/</u> titled Close Encounters: Commercial Shipping and You.) A loaded container ship could have much less visibility due to the cargo.



At a speed of 20 knots a ship travels 34 feet per second. It will take only three minutes to cover one nautical mile.

It's not always a big cargo ship and a sailboat or fishing boat. While negotiating the Intracoastal Waterway on Lux, we've had kayakers and small fishing boats decide that they can cross the waterway channel in front of us. They are invariably looking over their shoulder to see if they've made a poor decision. In



these circumstances we slow down and let them cross, though we subsequently comment on their longevity when they make such decisions.

I apply these same principles when I'm out kayaking or paddle boarding. Stay out of the busy channel. Cross channels at right angles. Look both ways to make sure the channel is clear when I have to cross.

We often jokingly refer to the crossing situation as *The Law of Gross Tonnages*. The larger, heavier vessel will win in any collision, so just avoid the possibility of a collision.

What should the smaller vessel do? Don't impede the large vessel's ability to navigate, especially in narrow channels like near the Bay Bridge, at inlets, and within the ICW. It's always best to go astern of larger vessels. When faced with a similar situation we take a course parallel to the large vessel, staying outside the channel, until it has passed, then cross astern. In some situations we might have to reduce speed while running parallel. There's no way we'll get run over by taking this action. Of course, if we're in close proximity to the ship, we might have to be prepared to handle a large wake as the ship passes. It's often better to take the wake on the stern than to try to round up and take it head-on.

If we're going to be in close proximity to the shipping channel, such in the northern bay's narrow waters, we'll contact the ship on the VHF Channel 13 and inform them of our intentions. That way they're not guessing what we'll do and we're not guessing their intentions. In another situation, we were heading west across the gulf stream from the Abacos to Florida at night. A ship's navigation lights and AIS indicated a northbound ship on a near collision course. We were the *stand-on* vessel, according to the navigation rules. We hailed it on VHF Ch 13. The ship's crew member on radio watch answered all our questions with "*We will hold course and speed*" in a very thick accent. While we were the stand-on vessel, the law of gross tonnages dictated that we change course and speed to let the ship pass by, eliminating the possibility of crossing ahead of it. Radio communications allowed us to know what they were going to do and act accordingly.

Stay safe out on the water!
