Consistent with my mantra of “there are many boating adventures to be had”, I recall a discussion I had with a couple at the District Five Summer Council Meeting who, in addition to completing the Great Loop, had completed the Down East Circle Route.

My curiosity was piqued, so I embarked on some research of what experiences this cruising route would provide. The Down East Circle Route is a 2,400 nautical mile route that loops around New England and among the islands of the Canadian Maritimes. The voyage takes less time to complete than the Great Loop, but the timing of the trip makes a world of difference. The area of the route has a penchant for pea soup foggy conditions in June through mid-July, and the tides can be daunting at any time of the year. Along the route is the Bay of Fundy, an extension of the Gulf of Maine, whose tides can range from 11 feet along the southwest shore of Nova Scotia to 53 feet at the head of the Bay. It has been reported that the Bay of Fundy has the highest tides in the world.

I purchased and have almost completed reading [A Complete Cruising Guide – Down East Circle Route](#) by Captain Cheryl Barr, who resides in Nova Scotia. My takeaway is that this would be a trip with boating challenges but also the promise of lifetime experiences. There are historic sites along the route such as Old Québec City as well as quaint seaside villages. There is also an abundance of wildlife. Photographs of the scenery along the route reflect its breathtaking beauty and there are side trips that can be taken that would indeed be memorable.

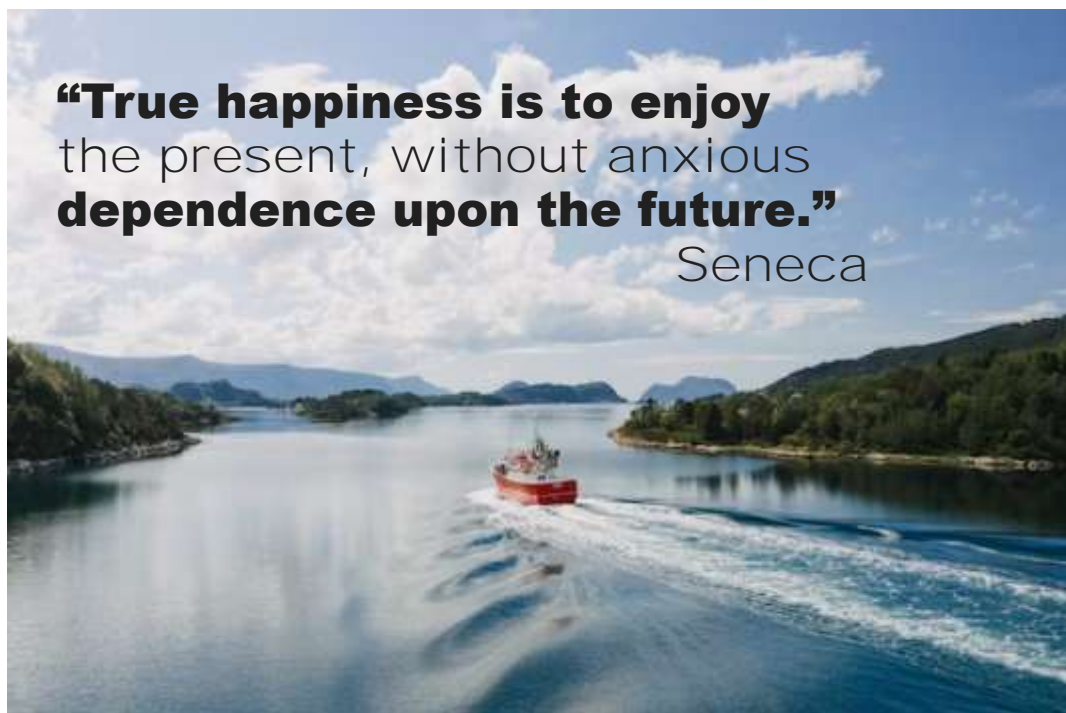
A pretty day is the perfect excuse to spend time with other boaters.

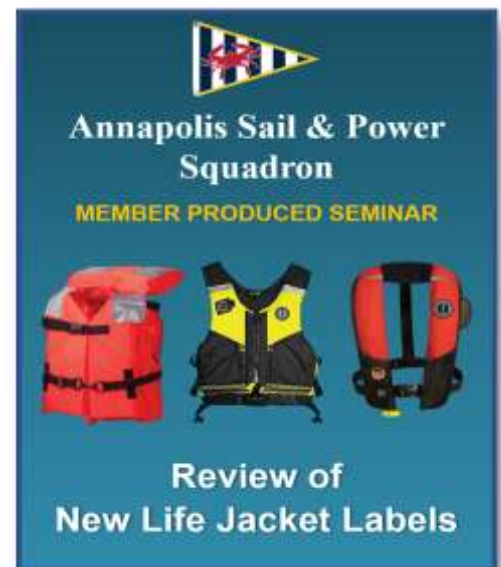

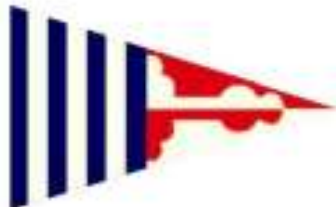

The end of August found your SEO Mike Maszczenski in Kansas City! Mike was invited to be one of the speakers at this year's Governing Board of the United States Power Squadron, America's Boating Club. This yearly event features committee meetings, workshops, seminars, and more.

Our adventure started Thursday morning with the Keynote Breakfast. Emily Coffin, Natural Resources Section Chief, Operations Division, of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Kansas City District, spoke at length about the role of this group in protecting and promoting all our waterways. Locally, we're aware of this group's role in dredging. But, did you know that they played an important role in the PFD loaner programs? Their aims and ours dovetail quite nicely as we all want safe recreational uses out on our waterways.

One session offered information on the upcoming iMIS system- the new system that will automate many membership functions. It also promises to allow efficient management of membership information and events.

There were many other workshops and seminars covering squadron, district, and national concerns. It was a great opportunity to not only learn about different aspects of our organization, but also to be able to share opinions and ideas.

Of course, the best part of the Governing Board meeting is the opportunity to meet members from across the United States and beyond. It was reassuring to hear that we all share many of the same concerns. It was exciting to learn what other squadrons are doing - ideas we might be able to try here at Annapolis.



Finally, it was exciting that one of our own - Mike - would be asked to speak at a national meeting. Mike gave his presentation on apps for boaters. He actually tried it out at the District 5 Summer Council meeting in July. The polished presentation shared apps on navigation, weather, and general boating information. The audience was very receptive. In fact, some even asked for the slides so they could share the information with their squadrons.

All in all, it was a great experience in Kansas City. Of course, it's always a great time when boaters have the chance to get together.





Tips for Safe Paddleboarding

I bought an inflatable paddleboard this year. While I've successfully used paddleboards in the past, they must have been bigger, wider, more stable boards because my board seems very tippy. (I'm not considering the fact that I'm older and may have less acute balance – no, absolutely, it can't be about my age and reflexes.) Much to my surprise, I was quite jittery on the board, which is 10 ft long by 30" wide.

One day, while kayaking, I talked with a fellow on a fiberglass paddle board about stability. It turned out that he has both the hard board and an inflatable. His answer: "It's all about time-on-the-water." Sure enough, the more I get out on my new paddleboard, the more comfortable I feel. And, it only took about three hours to get more comfortable. Handling significant boat wakes and paddling long distance is still a learning process.

First, I picked a safe place to learn. I waited until the jellyfish population subsided in our creek so I didn't have to deal with stings. The warm water temperature of late summer also figured into the equation. I took the time to watch several YouTube videos on paddle boarding, and to learn the common safety tips to follow. It pays to look at some of the beginner paddling tips like the optimum paddle length, how to hold the paddle, and the most efficient paddling strokes. While some of this may seem to be advanced tips, the combination of things you learn, when applied, make for safer, more stable paddling.

A YouTube search for "paddle boarding technique" returns a long list of videos, many just a few minutes long. I started with this one: "Learn to SUP in 5 minutes".

The first safety tip is to attach the board to yourself with the tether. It's too easy to fall off, have the board scoot away from you and then blow away down-wind faster than you can swim to catch it. Paddling after dark may also make it impossible to know where your board is after falling. The tether on my board is Velcro with good padding to make it comfortable, and I don't notice that it's around my ankle.

You'll also want a PFD of some sort. It's tempting to use an inflatable of some sort, either vest style or belt. But, consider that when it is inflated it will be much more difficult to reboard if you fall off.

Another safety tip is to look out towards where you're paddling. It really does make me less jittery on the board, and I've started looking around. When I start looking down, I lose the fixed frame of reference that the features around provide, and the board becomes more tippy.

Paddling, surprisingly enough, contributes to stability. I find that I'm focused on paddling form instead of thinking that I might fall. Each paddle stroke is about pulling the board through the water and, sure enough, the paddle's contact with the water enhances my stability.



There's another interesting safety tip that I hadn't initially considered. When you fall, don't try to save yourself by falling on the board. Fall away from the board, staying away from those sharp fins on the bottom of the board. It also prevents you from getting bruises or breaking something upon impacting the board. Those inflatable boards get pretty hard, so don't think that just because it's inflatable that it will be soft.

Finally, it's heading towards fall now and I'll stop paddleboarding when the water gets cold. Some people use a wet suit or dry suit, which might be sufficient as the water gets colder. Personally, I'd rather get in the big, stable kayak and stay out of the cold water.

Stay safe around the water!

Poplar Island: An International Model of Beneficial Use

Poplar Island is an ecosystem restoration project located in the Chesapeake Bay in Talbot County, Maryland which began in the 1990's. The project beneficially reuses the dredged material from the approach channels to the Baltimore Harbor to restore lost remote island habitat within the Chesapeake Bay. The partnership between the Maryland Port Administration and U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has been in place for over 20 years and has seen the restoration of almost 400 acres of wetland habitat. Restoration of the uplands habitat and additional wetland acres is planned, and the island is scheduled for completion in the 2040's. Over 400 different species of wildlife have been documented and over 30 different birds have been confirmed as nesting onsite. Learn about Poplar Island's unique story and continuing habitat successes at this talk given by Kristina Motley from Maryland Environmental Service.
