As most of you know, ABC/USPS is converting its legacy databases to a new system called iMIS. If you have not done this yet, do it right now! Go to americasboatingclub.org. You MUST make a new account. You cannot use your certificate number and the password that was assigned to you 20 years ago when you joined USPS. Think up a NEW, clever and memorable login and password to log in. This will forevermore get you into iMIS. When you log in from now on, from the drop-down, you can go to either the

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member portal or the member website (the legacy USPS site). In the member portal, go through your profile and make sure everything is cool. Make sure that you are part of ASPS as a member or associate member. If not, you should call National, and they will gladly work one-on-one with you to fix it. Be patient. This is a massive project, and it is going to take time and have its challenges. This is going to be great.

"What is National doing for me and my squadron to get us new members?" This is a complaint I have heard incessantly since I joined over a decade ago. Well, it turns out that National ABC/USPS is doing a lot. They have contracted with a young, vibrant, active marketing firm specializing in marine organizations called SEO Marine. SEO stands for "search engine optimization." When you Google something, the results that pop up at the top of the list are the ones that have applied the best "search engine optimization." That's what we want! When somebody Googles boating education or boating safety, we want to pop up at the top of the list. SEO Marine is here to help us come out on top.

What goes around, comes around. Prior to 2008, all squadrons and districts had to provide for their own insurance needs. Since 2008, National USPS has maintained a massive insurance policy that covered all of the meetings, boat shows, VSCs, on the water activities, director and officer (D&O) coverage and general liability for all the squadrons and districts as well as National. Well, all good things must come to an end. CHUBB insurance is dropping ABC/USPS as of 1 December due to a non-boating related occurrence.

National is hard at work evaluating alternative companies to replace our insurance coverage, but creating a policy so large could take 6 months to a year. District is likewise working on a policy to cover itself and all D5 squadrons. The ASPS Exec Comm has decided to look for our own Directors and Officers coverage and cover our events with individual event coverage. **Do not do any VSCs or on-the-water activities under the great name of ASPS until we get this insurance finalized.** 

We plan to have event insurance for the ASPS Holiday Party at Pirates Cove in Galesville. This is shaping up to be a blast and seats are limited, so please sign up to come. Details are in this newsletter.



As we store our boats for the winter and remember our boating adventures of this past summer, remember that there are still holiday activities on or near the water that we can enjoy.

Chesapeake Bay is famous for its lively on-the-water holiday celebrations. Here are some highlights of popular events:

# 1. Parade of Lights Boat Parade (Annapolis, MD) - December 14, 6-8 PM

Each December, Annapolis hosts a spectacular Eastport Yacht Club Lights Parade, where boaters decorate their vessels with holiday lights and festive displays. These illuminated boats sail along the waterfront, drawing large crowds. Some boats feature music, animated decorations, and even Santa sightings.

### <u>2. Lights on the Bay (Sandy Point State Park, MD) -</u> November 24 - January 1, Sun-Thurs, 5-9 PM Fri-Sat, 5-10 PM

Although it's a drive-through event rather than on-water, Lights on the Bay offers a scenic, holiday light display right along the water at Sandy Point State Park. The event raises funds for the SPCA of Anne Arundel County and features over 60 animated and stationary light displays, including nautical scenes and holiday classics.

### 3. Yorktown Lighted Boat Parade (Yorktown, VA) - Dec 7 6-8 PM

Yorktown, on the southern side of the Chesapeake Bay, hosts its own Lighted Boat Parade each December. Boaters compete for prizes as they cruise down the York River, and viewers can enjoy the procession from the Riverwalk Landing piers and beach.

### 4. Christmas on Cockrell's Creek (Reedville, VA) - Dec 13-15

Hosted by the Reedville Fishermen's Museum, Christmas on Cockrell's Creek includes a candlelight house tour and often a lighted boat parade. This celebration also supports local heritage and maritime culture, with plenty of festive decorations along the water.

### 5. Solomons Christmas Walk & Lighted Boat Parade (Solomons, MD) - Dec 7, 6:15 PM

Solomons Island lights up with its annual Lighted Boat Parade as part of the community's larger Christmas Walk celebration. Boaters decorate their vessels and parade along the Patuxent River, accompanied by festive activities, music, and Santa's arrival.

### 6. Rock Hall Lighted Boat Parade (Rock Hall, MD) - Nov 30, 5-6:30 PM

Rock Hall's Annual Lighted Boat Parade kicks off the town's holiday festivities. Residents and visitors can enjoy a waterfront view as holiday-themed boats cruise the harbor, capped by a holiday celebration with food, music, and local vendors.

These events reflect the Chesapeake Bay's vibrant maritime culture, with each community adding its own unique twist to celebrate the holiday season on the water.



# The Art of Towing Terry Slattery, Lord of the Electrons

Congratulations if you've never had to get involved in towing a boat: either having yours towed or towing another boat. On board Lux, we've been involved with both over the past few years and can offer some tips on making it a safe experience.

First, know your limitations and whether a towing situation should be left up to the professionals. Does the crew have sufficient experience with towing to make it a safe operation? This is the primary concern when considering a tow. The crew needs to know how to evaluate the situation, select the appropriate equipment (fenders and lines and cleats), safely

connect the boats without causing damage, and perform the operation without jeopardizing the crew and both vessels.

Next is evaluating the conditions on the water. A tow in calm seas with light winds is quite different than dealing with large waves and vessel wakes. Don't forget that even if conditions are benign, you may have to be prepared to handle large wakes from vessels that aren't aware of your situation. Towing over a long distance is substantially more risky since the chances are much greater that you'll encounter waves or wakes.

What about your equipment, starting with the two boats? Is the towing boat suitable for towing another boat? A large towing vessel isn't always best as it can put high stress on lines, cleats, and vessels if not done carefully. Similarly, a small vessel may not have the capacity to handle towing a large vessel, potentially putting the small vessel at risk. In addition, do the two vessels have properly installed cleats in the right locations for towing? A small powerboat's aft cleats are rarely suitable for towing a larger boat. Conversely, the bow cleats on a larger boat may pull out when subjected to the high shock loads of transiting waves or wakes.






The additional necessary equipment includes fenders and lines that are suitable for towing. Fenders need to be large enough to protect both vessels when operating in close quarters. Note that transiting waves and wakes will put significant pinch and pull loads on fenders and their attachment points. Tying fenders onto lifelines is not suitable due to the risk of lifeline damage. The line(s) for towing behind need to be long enough to allow the line to stretch when subject to shock loads when crossing waves and wakes. Lines less than 60 feet are probably too short. But, that elastic line also needs to be strong enough that it won't break when surging over a wave. When a line breaks under stress, it springs back like a rubber band which can cause significant damage to boats and crew. For example, Lux has a 5/8-inch diameter, 75ft, nylon megabraid line that we use for most towing situations. Towing slowly will help reduce loads to safe levels. Tighter maneuvering situations may require reducing the two line length or switching to side-by-side towing, also called "towing on the hip."

Finally, establish a good means of communication between vessel captains for the duration of the tow. The VHF radio is excellent for this. If that fails, try to use a phone call. As a last resort, agree on some hand signals to indicate changes in speed, direction, and towing conditions.

As the Power Squadron pledge says: "Render assistance whenever possible." The important part of this pledge is to understand when towing is possible and when it is best to call in the professionals.

### John Wesley Nash Nominated for the Charles F. Chapman Award



# Dinner Delights Lt/C Georgiana Maszczenski, S

Couldn't make it to the November dinner meeting? You missed a very informative presentation – *Highlights of Chesapeake Bay History*. Our guest speaker was Rachel Frazier, the Director of Reference Services for the Maryland State Archives. Originally called the Hall of Records, it opened in 1935. It was renamed the Maryland State Archives in 1984. The main focus is the collection and maintenance of government records for our state. However, the State Archives also maintains special collections of interest to the state – private records, maps, newspapers, etc. Rachel pulled from this collection to share interesting highlights of history on the bay through the eyes of our own citizens.

Here are 10 of the many things Rachel shared at this meeting:

- The Chesapeake Bay was once dotted with resorts. Passenger boats would take vacationers to a resort for the day.
- In the 1920s and 1930s, beaches on the bay were segregated. Carrs Beach and Sparrows Beach were 2 such resorts. These resorts were popular enough to attract performers such as Sarah Vaughn.
- Our waterways were also used in various conflicts. Rachel shared a letter from 1814 that told about British warships on the bay.
- In 1893, the Chesapeake Bay supplied 50% of the world's oyster demand.
- Rachel shared a picture from the Great Freeze of 1893. The storm literally froze in the Annapolis harbor. Waterman worried about the lighthouses on the bay.
- Captain John Smith published the first map of the Chesapeake Bay. It was important not only in showing the bay itself, but it listed indigenous tribes around the bay.
- Our State Archives is one of the largest in the nation.



Everyone is invited to visit the Maryland State Archives – especially if you are seeking information about the history of our state. 



