He is well known for being the brain and brawn behind the wildly popular safe boating channel, America's Boating Channel. For me, he was much more than that. He and his wife Sari were terrific friends and mentors. He gave me the confidence to take on leadership roles in the squadron and district. I will never forget his

infectious smile and how he always had to stoop over just a little bit to get down to my level. He was bigger than life, and literally seemed to be seven feet tall. He leaves a big hole in our lives, and will be sorely missed.



We had a great time at the 2024 District 5 Spring Counsil, Conference and Change of Watch. This event gets more fun every year. You really ought to think about attending in the future. Ocean City is quite nice in the off season. After many years at the Princess Royale, we tried the Holiday Inn this year. It is a very nice venue and puts all the daily events, including the banquet, on one floor, within close

proximity to each other.

The weekend started out on Thursday night with a delicious ice cream social hosted by District Commander Joe Gibson and his Chief Aide Rosa Gibson. Friday was busy with officer training, instructor recertification training conducted by Mike Maszczenski, and other extremely interesting presentations. DEO John O'Reilly helped us understand how to get around National's website, which is chock full of information, but extremely frustrating to navigate if you don't know how. Fortunately, National is close to changing its IT systems over to IMUS, which will make navigating the website and their databases much easier.

Another interesting presentation was done by the folks at William and Mary's Virginia Institute of Marine Sciences (VIMS) about their Depth and Recovery Program. The program seeks to do two things. One is to locate and recover abandoned and lost crab pots (https://www.vims.edu/about/search/?q=recovering+crab+pots). There are tens of thousands of crab pots out in the bay which continue to catch all manner of wildlife. When Virginia

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closed the winter crab dredging season, this program hired waterman to locate and recover these pots. So far, they have collected over 35,000 pots full of crabs, 41 species of fish, diving birds, muskrats and turtles, including diamondback terrapins. The abandoned pots are self baiting. As animals get trapped and die, they provide bait. The pots keep catching and killing endlessly.

The VIMS Coastal Resilience Project is designed to collect depth data in the shallow water tributaries of the bay in order to create models to help mitigate flooding and pollution from storm surge and rising water levels. Dundalk and Northern Neck squadrons, from District 5, are participating in a pilot program to assist with data collection, which entails collecting depth soundings in areas that are 6 feet or less. Initial volunteers would need a shallow draft boat, of course, but VIMS expects that they will eventually be able to expand their program to deeper waters so that any of us could participate if desired.













Friday night of the conference highlights the ever popular hospitality suites. The ASPS suite was one of the most popular as always. This year's ASPS suite theme was based on Gilligan's Island. Several of the characters were in attendance including Skipper, the professor, Ginger, Marianne, Thurston Howell III, and Mrs. Howell. Gilligan was not there because nobody had a red shirt. The correct name for the tropical themed suite was "Don't Be Like Gilligan - Be a Knowledgeable Boater." We had float plans, communication fliers and safety messages throughout the suite along with scrumptious food, desserts and beverages. Thank you, Georgiana Maszczenski, for brainstorming the theme and designing the room. Thank you, Carol Rechner, Lorrie Short and Michael Maszczenski for setting it up and Ralph Leasure for bartending. Thank you, Kent Narrows SPS, for sharing the cost and especially to Kathy Burke for the AMAZING cheesecakes, flip-flop cookies and humming bird cupcakes!

P/D/C Marty Lafferty, representing Kent Narrows SPS, and I got our steps in on Saturday collecting squadron hardware as District 5 gave out awards. Kent Narrows SPS cleaned up in the Cooperative Charting category, placing 33rd Nationally with several individuals making the National Honor Roll, including Dick Radlinski, John Locke, Chuck Wells, and Larry Miller. ASPS member Ron Ricketts made the Honor Roll as well, placing 37th individually overall in National ranking. Bill Eldridge received a District 5 award for performing the second most VSCs in the District with 164. He also received an award for 5 years as a Century Club member, which is awarded to those who have done at least 100 VSCs per year for 5 years. ASPS and KNSPS received honorable mention as top squadron performers in the VSC category. Thank you to ALL the KNSPS and ASPS vessel examiners.

ASPS and KNSPS both received the Distinctive Communicator Award in the outstanding newsletter category. ASPS received the 2024 National Communications Award for Newsletters. We've recently concluded our participation in the Bay Bridge Boat show. I want to thank everyone who volunteered their time and efforts to help make this show a success. We had quite a few people stop by and sign up up for a Vessel Safety Check. Others are interested in taking courses. And, we'll see who may be interested in membership.

Please don't forget the upcoming Annapolis Spring Sailboat Show. We still need your help for this one. I was amazed to learn that since 2021 there have been over 40 reported incidents of large cargo ships reporting complete or partial loss of propulsion, power or steering in Maryland waters, according to U.S. Coast Guard reports. Let's give them a wide berth.

The D5 Summer Rendezvous and Council are scheduled for July 25-28. It should be a great time down in Solomons. Don't forget to register if you are planning to go. Also, please contact Chief Commander Ralph Bernard if you are interested in joining the cruise that he will be leading preceding the rendezvous.





Dinner Delights

If you missed our March dinner meeting, you missed an interesting and informative presentation by Scott Berg. Scott Berg is a Marine Surveyor with 35 years of experience with marine repair. Here's some of the information Scott shared:

- A marine survey is an inspection and evaluation of a yacht or other vessel. It involves both the construction and the condition of the vessel.
- Every survey is based on standards. These standards guide the final detailed report for use by the buyer, the seller, banks, insurance companies, and more.

• Keep in mind that a survey is a snapshot of the day it was taken. It can be useful for information later, but it isn't necessarily true for the days that have passed since the survey was done.

- This is a self-regulated industry. You don't have to have certification or accreditation to claim to be a marine surveyor.
- If you decide to hire a surveyor, look for ABYC certification and experience on boats like yours.
 You can also ask for additional educational certifications like HVAC.
- The <u>LAST</u> place to look for a surveyor is by asking for a referral from the broker listing your boat! The incentive for the broker is to sell your boat, not to make sure you have the best survey.
- The best place to look for a surveyor is a referral from someone local that you trust. This could be a member of a yacht club, marina offices, boat stores, or boating education classes.
- Make sure you know what kind of survey you want. You can get a pre-purchase condition evaluation, a mechanical/engine condition, and/or a survey that evaluates the electrical systems, electronics, and communication systems of your boat.



- Remember that buying a boat without a survey can lead to trouble getting insurance.
- If you get a request from your insurance company for a survey prior to insurance renewal, be sure to know what is needed. There's no such thing as a 'standard' evaluation. If you need information from your insurance company, be sure to speak to the underwriter, not the salesman!

If you were unable to join us, you missed a great presentation about marine surveying. As always, we are able to offer dinner meetings that bring together friends who love boating. We also always offer informative speakers, so you can learn something interesting about boating on the Chesapeake Bay and beyond. We look forward to seeing you soon.







Marine Navigation, the replacement for Piloting, starts October 1, 2024. It presents the use of GPS electronic chart programs, as well as basic paper chart rileting. Even if you have taken the Piloting government this is a great intro into alor

piloting. Even if you have taken the Piloting course, this is a great intro into electronic navigation.

Marine Navigation is the first of the navigational classes, focusing on techniques for piloting a boat in coastal and inland conditions. The course emphasizes planning and checking, along with the use of GPS and other electronic systems for determining position, and introduces digital charting along with traditional charting, compass and dead reckoning skills. Plotting, use of the compass, aids to navigation, electronic tools and a host of related topics are included in this all-new approach to coastal, inland and river piloting. This course uses the Bowditch Bay practice chart and local charts, the USPS 4"X15" plotter and dividers. A computer with OpenCPN must be student-provided.

The Student Kit includes the Student Manual, the Plotting and Labeling Standards Learning Guide and instructions for downloading, installing and using OpenCPN. OpenCPN is a free marine navigation





program that is state-of-the-art, and in wide use by commercial and recreational boating enthusiasts. OpenCPN runs on a variety of environments, including Windows, Android tablets and phones, and MAC OS, but not iPhones or iPads. (The larger screens of desktop or laptop computers work best.)



Welcome to Radar for Boaters. Developed by the Canadian Power and Sail Squadrons, this course is up to date for radar technologies available now and into the near future. The course covers the different types of radar equipment,

It covers what you need to know about radar, from how and where to mount the antenna to how to interpret the displays, so you can use your radar for collision avoidance and for navigational purposes.

However, this is not a requirement to sign up for the course. It is also suggested that the following courses should be taken before this course: *Marine Navigation* and *Advanced Marine Navigation*. Participants should also have boating experience. Previously required for BOC-Offshore Navigation certification, as of May 4, 2019, *Radar for Boaters* is a required course for its BOC-Advanced Coastal Navigation certification.

Common Reasons Boats Fail a VSC Lt Dick Radlinski, AP-CN

A VSC (Vessel Safety Check) is a voluntary safety inspection performed by a qualified Vessel Examiner (VE). The inspection follows a procedure specified by the US Coast Guard and is typically done annually. You can request a VSC on your boat on the US Power Squadrons website or by talking directly to one of the VEs in our squadron.

Having been a VE for a number of years, I find that although the majority of boats that I inspect pass and earn an annual VSC sticker, many of those that do fail do so for similar reasons:

Expired Visual Distress Signals (VDS) – Pyrotechnic devices typically expire three years after their manufacture date. While there are now US Coast Guard approved battery powered strobe lights that can replace pyrotechnic devices, batteries can go dead over time and need to be checked. In one case, I found a brand new device where the owner had failed to install batteries.

<u>Expired Fire Extinguishers</u> – Fire Extinguishers over 12 years old are considered out of date. The date of manufacture is usually stamped on the bottom of the extinguisher canister. Regardless of age, they must also have a pressure gauge that reads in the green.

<u>Inoperative Navigation or Anchor Lights</u> - Bulbs can burn out, or corrosion in the wiring or bulb socket can render the light inoperative. Fixtures with LED bulbs draw significantly less current and are less likely to fail due to longer bulb life. Changing from incandescent bulbs to LEDs, particularly for anchor lights, which are operated overnight, conserves battery power, and is a worthwhile upgrade. Just be sure LEDs are rated for marine navigation use.

<u>Out of Date Documents and Stickers</u> – Boat owners forget to renew their registrations or forget to put the updated paperwork onboard their vessel. Also, the corresponding updated stickers must be placed on the outside of the boat. USCG Documented boats need a current State of Maryland Documented Vessel sticker on both sides of the vessel.

<u>Documented Vessel lacks Permanent Numbers</u> - USCG Documented vessels are required to display their documentation number in 3 inch high numerals on a visible interior structure of the hull. The number must be preceded by "NO." to identify that it is the documentation number. Many boat dealers provide this on new boats, so it is a good idea to check that your boat complies with this requirement. (I was the third owner of a boat that did not have a documentation number when I purchased it, despite the fact that the documentation paperwork was current).

<u>Vessel Lacks Trash Disposal Plan</u> – If your boat is over 40 ft. long, you must carry a written trash disposal plan onboard. This can be a simple one or two page document that explains what you are going to do with your trash. A fill-in-the-blanks document can be downloaded from the internet here waste_management_plan.pdf.

<u>Vessel Lacks Official Copy of the Rules of the Road</u> – Also, if your boat is over 40 ft. long you must carry an **official US government copy of the entire Rules of the Road** onboard. If you have the US Coast Guard App on your phone, it provides this document, or you can purchase a hard copy of the document online or in most boating supply stores.

While there are additional requirements that must be met to pass a VSC, the above items are the most frequent reasons boats fail VSCs. Why not check your boat at the beginning of each season to make sure it complies with the requirements discussed above? Navigation and anchor lights can fail at any time during the season and should be checked more frequently.
