The October dinner meeting speaker will be Carys Mitchelmore, PhD, of the University of Maryland Center for Environmental Science. Carys will be talking about plastic pollution in the ocean and Chesapeake Bay.

Prior to the meeting, you may want to familiarize yourself with the significant environmental concerns of plastic pollution in the ocean and its widespread and harmful impacts on marine ecosystems, wildlife, and human health. Some of the main concerns include:

Harm to Marine Life

Ingestion: Marine animals, including fish, seabirds, turtles, and mammals, often mistake plastic debris for food. Ingesting plastic can cause blockages in their digestive systems, malnutrition, and death. For instance, sea turtles may mistake plastic bags for jellyfish.

Entanglement: Animals can become entangled in discarded fishing gear, plastic rings, and other debris, leading to injury, restricted movement, suffocation, or drowning.

Microplastics

Breakdown into Microplastics: Over time, larger plastic items break down into tiny fragments called microplastics, which are less than 5mm in size. These microplastics are found in all parts of the ocean, from the surface to the deep sea, and are consumed by a wide range of marine organisms, entering the food chain.

Health Risks: Microplastics can accumulate toxins, which are then ingested by marine life and potentially humans when we consume seafood.

Impact on Marine Ecosystems

Disruption of Food Chains: Plastic pollution disrupts marine food chains. When smaller organisms ingest microplastics, it impacts the health and reproduction of species, which in turn affects larger predators, leading to imbalances in marine ecosystems.

Coral Reefs: Plastics can damage coral reefs by physically smothering corals, blocking sunlight, and promoting the spread of diseases.

Economic Impacts

Fisheries: Plastic pollution can damage fishing gear, contaminate fish stocks, and harm coastal economies that depend on fisheries.

Tourism: Coastal areas and beaches polluted with plastic waste are less attractive to tourists, affecting the tourism industry in many countries.

Persistence and Accumulation

Longevity: Plastics are highly durable and can persist in the ocean for hundreds of years. The problem continues to grow because new plastic waste is added to the ocean every year, while existing plastic breaks down very slowly.

Accumulation in Ocean Gyres: Plastics tend to accumulate in large, slow-moving ocean currents called gyres, forming massive "garbage patches," such as the Great Pacific Garbage Patch.




Human Health Concerns

Food Chain Contamination: As microplastics and toxic chemicals accumulate in marine life, they can enter the human food chain through the consumption of seafood, potentially leading to health issues.

Water Contamination: Plastics and the chemicals they contain (like BPA and phthalates) can contaminate water sources, potentially impacting human drinking water supplies.

Addressing ocean plastic pollution requires global cooperation, sustainable waste management practices, reduction in single-use plastics, and a shift toward more sustainable materials and recycling initiatives.

It's boat show time again.

So, it's up to me to convince you that it is worthwhile for you to volunteer some of your time to cover our booths at the Powerboat Show and/or the Sailboat Show.

Let's start with the Powerboat Show. First, it's easy. Take the shuttle from Navy Stadium to the entrance. Pick up your badge or stamp from the office at 100 Compromise St. We are scheduled to be in a 10 x 10' booth (C15)

on the North side of Ego Alley. It is in a covered tent so weather should not be problem.

You don't have to be a power boater to work the show since our objective is to educate folks about the Power Squadrons and to inform them about why our educational offerings will benefit them and their boating knowledge and safety. After, or before, your three hour shift, you are in free to the entire Boat Show until closing.

The Sailboat Show this year will be unique in that we have arranged to have a 10 x 20' space. This will be our own tent in space Land 71. Our tent will be water proof, but weather may be more of an issue.

The process of getting there is the same as the Powerboat Show. Again, after your shift, you are free to enjoy the show.

There are always questions from volunteers so I will address some that I've heard. Shifts are normally 3 hours. We can have 2 people per shift. Duties are to engage attendees, ask open ended questions about their boating, offer information about our programs including educational, vessel safety checks and being in a club with like-minded boaters. If they are interested, ask them for their contact info: name, phone and email address.

Wear-squadron shirt, name tag and comfortable shoes. Arrive a little early for your shift for a briefing about how things are going. Call me if you have any problems, can't make your shift, etc.

We will have some updated brochures this year. We will have a TV screen with America's Boating Channel videos available, and we will also have an informative slide show running on a loop. We will probably change the set-up of the booth to encourage people to come in.

Now it's your part, please go onto our website under "Useful Information", click on "Boat Shows" and sign up for as many time slots that you feel comfortable. Also, you can use the links in the boat show ad on the next page of the Anchor Watch. As of this writing, there are many slots available.





Marine Navigation, the replacement for Piloting, presents the use of GPS electronic chart programs, as well as basic paper chart piloting. Even if you have taken the Piloting course, this is a great intro into electronic navigation.



Marine Navigation is the first of the navigational classes, focusing on techniques for piloting a boat in coastal and inland conditions. The course emphasizes planning and checking, along with the use of GPS and other electronic systems for determining position, and introduces digital charting along with traditional charting, compass and dead reckoning skills. Plotting, use of the compass, aids to navigation, electronic tools and a host of related topics are included in this all-new approach to coastal, inland and river piloting. This course uses the Bowditch Bay practice chart and local charts, the USPS 4"X15" plotter and dividers. A computer with OpenCPN must be student-provided.

The Student Kit includes the Student Manual, the Plotting and Labeling Standards Learning Guide and instructions for downloading, installing and using OpenCPN. OpenCPN is a free marine navigation program that is state-of-the-art, and in wide use by commercial and recreational boating enthusiasts. OpenCPN runs on a variety of environments, including Windows, Android tablets and phones, and MAC OS, but not iPhones or iPads. (The larger screens of desktop or laptop computers work best.)



Welcome to Radar for Boaters. Developed by the Canadian Power and Sail Squadrons, this course is up to date for radar technologies available now and into the near future. The course covers the different types of radar equipment, their capabilities and limitations, as well as their features and how they apply to students' needs. It covers what you need to



know about radar, from how and where to mount the antenna to how to interpret the displays, so you can use your radar for collision avoidance and for navigational purposes.

Students attending this course preferably should have completed *America's Boating Course* (or another NASBLA-approved boating safety course). However, this is not a requirement to sign up for the course. It is also suggested that the following courses should be taken before this course: *Marine Navigation* and *Advanced Marine Navigation*. Participants should also have boating experience. Previously required for BOC-Offshore Navigation certification, as of May 4, 2019, *Radar for Boaters* is a required course for its BOC-Advanced Coastal Navigation certification.

From America's Boating Channel Fire Extinguisher Regulations

In 2022, the Coast Guard amended portable fire extinguisher rules for recreational vessels in the U.S., making it easier and less costly for millions of boat owners to maintain the onboard fire protection equipment that they need.

The rules do not change the number or types of extinguishers required on board but do simplify inspection and record-keeping requirements. The simplified rules also are now published with other recreational boating

rules, making it easier to identify them.

America's Boating Channel video <u>"Fire Extinguisher Regulations"</u> offers an overview of the rules that separates commercial and recreational vessel fire protection requirements. It will help you learn how to ensure that all required portable fire extinguishers comply. Also featured are tips for preventing onboard fires in the first place.





If you need a refresher on classifications and carriage requirements for marine fire extinguishers, the channel offers a second video titled "Fire Extinguisher Standards." It offers tips for placing and servicing fire extinguishers, and explains the acronym PASS. Above all, ensure that the proper number of functional fire extinguishers are on board, readily accessible and that all responsible adults on board know to pull, aim, squeeze, and sweep.

U.S. Coast Guard approved marine-type fire extinguishers fully charged and in good and serviceable condition are required on recreational boats where the engines or fuel system could pose a fire hazard. Good and serviceable means that a fire extinguisher aboard a recreational vessel is properly charged and reads charged if it has a pressure gauge reading or charge indicator, that the extinguisher has a pin lock that is firmly in place, that it does not show visible signs of significant corrosion or damage and has a discharge nozzle that is clean and free from obstructions. Disposable dry chemical extinguishers expire 12 years after their date of manufacture, and rechargeable extinguishers expire annually unless maintained by a certified technician.

- ★ In 1998, this was designated the state drink of Maryland!
- ★ Pirate ships convinced passing seafarers they were no threat by concealing most of the crew below deck. In contract, merchant ships, with nothing to hide, carried equipment and crew on deck and in plain sight. Today, this term means transparent and straightforward dealing.
- ★ This was made the State's reptile and official mascot of the University of Maryland College Park in 1994.
- ★ This is brush-like soft material attached to standing rigging to prevent chafe on the sails.





- ★ This knot is great when tying up a present single handed. It won't slip. Start a square knot with one more wrap before you tie the upper part. No extra thumb needed!
- ★ At one time, members of the navy could enjoy rum, beer and even wine. That ended with the appointment of Josephus Daniels as Secretary of the Navy. In 1914, he banned the use of alcoholic liquors on board any naval vessel, or even within any navy yard or station. To substitute, orders for coffee were increased. Sailors started calling this a cup of Josephus Daniels. What do we call it today?
- * What do we call a small vessel's flag used for identification or signaling?
- ★ Originally, this term meant making someone look as foolish as a baboon. It came into nautical use when British seamen were taken in by the ruse of enemy Spanish warships flying the flag of a friendly nation. These days, it means to con someone by clever, underhanded methods.
- ★ What do we call a floating mark that is anchored to the bottom?
- ★ This became the official sport of Maryland in 1962. Maryland was the first state to adopt an official sport.
