Good news! As you read this in January 2025, National USPS/ABC has secured insurance coverage nearly identical to the coverage we lost on 1 Dec 2024. National announced back in October, just as the holiday party and Change of Watch season began, that we had lost our insurance coverage for all events everywhere.

What?! You didn't know that National USPS/ABC provided insurance coverage for all of our ASPS events? Our meetings, socials, and hospitality suites? Our boat shows? On the water boating training? Vessel safety checks? Well, neither did I. It never crossed my mind that we had insurance, and, even worse, that we even needed insurance.

Well, these last few months have been an education for me and a majority of squadron and district bridges around the country. National was confident they would find another company willing to provide a similar policy at an


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affordable price, but they figured it would take at least 6 months and possibly longer. In the meantime, squadron and district bridges around the country were scrambling to find their own affordable polices and/or canceling December and January holiday parties and changes of watch ceremonies. It is a real testament to the dedication and hard work of our fellow USPS volunteers at the national level that they were able to secure a replacement insurance policy, not in 6 months, but within the same WEEK that the old policy expired!

It should be mentioned that prior to 2008, squadrons had to get their own insurance policies. We have become spoiled, in a sense, in that National has covered our insurance needs for decades, to the point that most of us didn't even know we had or needed insurance. It was just always there for us. These policies are extremely expensive. Insurance is the single largest cost at National. The largest percent of your dues to National go towards the very insurance that allows us, at the local squadron level, to conduct business, have parties and provide boating safety education to our community. Thank you to National USPS/ABC for covering our backs.

ASPS will have a large representation at the National USPS/ABC Annual meeting in Orlando as well on the Caribbean cruise to follow. Join us. And, start making reservations for the Summer Council on Smith Mt Lake. This is the same event that Marty Lafferty, Randy Stow and I planned for 2020. It was to be a grand event, and I can't wait to see how it would have turned out.

Our January dinner meeting speaker will be Hali Kilbourne, PhD, Associate Research Professor, University of Maryland, Center for Environmental Science. She will be talking about "Climate Change: Putting Today's Changes in the Context of Earth's History." Yes, the impacts of climate change are happening now! The Chesapeake Bay area is highly vulnerable to the effects of climate change, particularly due to its low-lying geography, extensive shoreline, and reliance on natural ecosystems. Here are a few notable locations experiencing significant impacts:

1. Tangier Island, Virginia

Impact: Tangier Island is rapidly disappearing due to sea level rise and erosion. The island has lost over two-thirds of its landmass since 1850 and is projected to become uninhabitable within a few decades without major intervention.

Cause: Rising sea levels combined with land subsidence (the region is sinking due to natural and human-induced factors).

Consequences: Threatened homes, loss of infrastructure, and displacement of its residents.

2. Norfolk, Virginia

Impact: Norfolk experiences frequent flooding due to rising sea levels and storm surges, even during high tides ("sunny day flooding").

Cause: A combination of global sea level rise and local land subsidence.

Consequences: Damage to property, roads, and the local economy, as well as impacts on naval operations at the Norfolk Naval Base.

3. Eastern Shore of Maryland

Impact: Coastal marshes and wetlands in places like Dorchester County are being inundated, threatening critical habitats for wildlife.

Cause: Sea level rise and erosion.

Consequences: Loss of biodiversity and increased vulnerability to storm surges and flooding.

4. Annapolis, Maryland

Impact: The city faces recurrent flooding, which disrupts local businesses, especially around the historic downtown area.

Cause: Higher water levels due to sea level rise and more intense rainfall events.

Consequences: Increased costs for flood mitigation and recovery efforts.

5. Smith Island, Maryland

Impact: Similar to Tangier Island, Smith Island is losing land due to rising waters and erosion.

Cause: Sea level rise and land subsidence.

Consequences: Shrinking landmass and cultural loss for the island's small, historic community.

6. Baltimore, Maryland

Impact: Urban flooding and increased stormwater runoff are becoming more frequent.

Cause: More intense storms and rising sea levels.

Consequences: Damage to infrastructure, including roads and buildings, and public health concerns due to

polluted floodwaters.





7. Hampton Roads, Virginia

Impact: This area is among the most vulnerable in the U.S. to sea level rise, with frequent flooding affecting homes, businesses, and military installations.

Cause: Sea level rise, land subsidence, and more severe storms.

Consequences: Economic losses, property damage, and challenges for the region's significant military presence.

Regional Impacts on the Chesapeake Bay

Water Quality: Warmer temperatures and increased rainfall are contributing to algal blooms, hypoxia (low oxygen levels), and a decline in water quality.

Ecosystems: Coastal habitats and species, such as blue crabs and oysters, are struggling to adapt to the changing conditions.

Agriculture: Farmland near the bay is experiencing saltwater intrusion, reducing its productivity.

Efforts to address these issues include climate adaptation strategies like restoring wetlands, constructing living shorelines, and implementing flood resilience measures.




Dr. Kali Kilbourne is a Research Associate Professor with the University of Maryland center for Environmental Science, at the Chesapeake Biological Laboratory campus. Before coming to Southern Maryland, Dr. Kilbourne was a visiting professor at McDaniel College and held a prestigious National Research Council postdoctoral position in which she worked with the Climate Diagnostics Group of the National Ocean and Atmospheric Administration Earth System Research She obtained Laboratory. undergraduate training in Geology from Smith College and graduate training in Marine Science from the University of South Florida. Her research focuses on

understanding the climate of the last 2000 years to provide context for modern changes and to improve our understanding of climate systems processes driving climate variability. Such information can help us improve climate models used for predicting future climate change by providing datasets of historical climate variability for data-model comparison.

Raft-Up Etiquette Terry Slattery, Lord of the Electrons

On-the-water raft-ups can pose a variety of safety problems, some related to personal injury and others due to contact between boats. I'll share some of these problems and how we address them on Lux, our Leopard 40 catamaran.

What is a raft-up?

Raft-ups are where two or more boats are tied side-by-side, forming a string of boats. One or

more boats will deploy an anchor to hold the raft in place. It is important that the larger boats be selected as an "anchor boat". A single anchor boat may be all that's needed for a five-boat raft-up in settled weather with little current predicted. Larger raft-ups will require more than one anchor boat.





In some instances the string of boats is modified to form a circle. In this case, at least four boats become anchor boats in the form of a big X with each anchor boat forming a leg. The non-anchor boats fill in the spaces between the anchor boats. Large circle raft -ups may require more anchor boats and always require a lot of coordination between participating boats.

Personal Safety

The most critical safety issues are those dealing with the safety of the crews. If two boats are going to hit, try to deploy a fender between them to cushion the contact. If that's not possible, don't try to use your arm or foot to fend off. There is real risk that you will have a crushed or broken limb from two boats weighing hundreds or thousands of pounds making contact. It's better to write a repair check than to deal with a medical situation.

Pay attention to the alignment of boats and their relative deck heights. You should avoid situations where some of the crew members have problems crossing from one vessel to the next as well as negotiating the decks of unfamiliar neighboring boats. We've found a portable step that can be rigged at our boarding gates to provide a more friendly step up if a boat with lower decks is tied to Lux.

Vessel Safety

Fenders are your friend. Use as many as you need to keep the boats from rubbing on each other. Tradition is that an approaching boat deploys its fenders and lines. This way it is easy to identify which equipment belongs to a vessel departing a raft.

Each boat will need four lines: bow, stern, and two springs. Avoid using short lines between cleats on two adjacent boats. use long lines to allow for some elastic stretch between boats as wakes and waves rock the



raft. Any waves that rock the raft may result in one of those cleats being pulled out or other similar damage. It may be best to extend a stern line across neighboring boats to a cleat farther away in order to provide enough length.


When rafting sailboats, make sure that their masts are staggered so that a wake from a passing boat doesn't cause rocking that results in the masts making contact with each other.

Use the VHF radio to communicate with the raft-up captain to learn where you'll raft-up. You can then prepare your fenders and lines. Approach the assigned location with about six feet of space between your boat and the raft. Six feet is close enough to easily pass lines yet far enough to provide maneuvering room without colliding. You're not parking a car in a marked parking space, so leave that space and avoid a boat repair bill. Note that wind and current may make the raft shift as you're approaching, so take that into account. Stop your boat when even with the raft and pass lines over. The raft-up vessel's crew will pull your boat over and secure lines.

Departing the Raft-Up Safely

Departing a raft-up also has some procedures to follow. First, don't disconnect from the raft-up if there's still a boat connected to your boat. When this happens, mass confusion and collisions are common.

Identify which lines are not carrying a load and drop them first. There will likely be one line that has most of the load, should there be wind or current. It will be the last one to untie. Once untied, it is often best to reverse away from the raft, which may seem counter-intuitive. Backing away keeps you away from anchor rodes that are ahead of the anchor boats. The wind and current also works in your favor (which may not be true if you're in a circle raft). Also, consider that going forward restricts the maneuvers you can do without your boat's stern swinging and hitting the raft.




