Lorrie's been to these meetings with me in the past, but for some reason I couldn't get her out of the pool to join me this time. She missed the whole meeting! Really?



Saturday night we attended the Annual Ball. This is the night everyone gets dressed to the nines. We followed suit and I put on my best Austin Powers/Prince/Jimi Hendrix duds and some cool Maryland shades. It was 70's night and it was a blast!

Last year when we did this cruise, it was the ship's third week out, essentially brand new. So, this year it's just a year old. Despite carrying 3400 guests and 1400 crew, it is surprisingly uncrowded. Walking around the ship at any time of day or night, I was amazed at how I could always find a secluded area to sit and watch the sunset or hang out in a pool. Certainly some places are busy at certain times, and you usually have to show up early to get a seat at the shows, but all in all, it's a very uncrowded cruise.

Our first stop was Bimini in the Bahamas, a short 50 miles east of Port Everglades. I could have gotten there in my little motorboat in a few hours. We had to leave the port at 5 PM, but couldn't arrive in Bimini until 7AM. In order to kill time, the ship sailed all night, first south beyond the tip of Florida, took a left and went east for 50 miles, then turned north all the way back up to Bimini. Lorrie and I spent the day with Pam and John at a resort beach. Those who spent time searching for shells were disappointed to have them all confiscated upon returning to the ship. There was a table at ship's security checkpoint overflowing with conch shells and other beach contraband.

After a day at sea we pulled into Cozumel. Lorrie and I did an open air bus tour that included a stop at a Mexican market. The black coral jewelry and leather backpacks were very nice. It cost 50 cents to take a leak, so for a dollar both Lorrie and I got to use the head. Next stop was a "family owned" tequila tasting. (Everything seemed to be "family owned" on our tour.) actually lost count. Both Lorrie and I found them delicious, so we bought a bottle of each, six bottles in all, and they threw in 2 Cuban cigars! The tour may have taken us to another stop, but I can't recall.

Alcohol is not allowed to be brought aboard the ship. Everybody knows that. They take the alcohol from you as you board and keep it for you until departing on the last day of the cruise. Lorrie and I struggled through the security checkpoint laden with 6 clanking bottles of tequila and blood shot eyes! I always set off the metal detector with my titanium knee. So after they patted me down and searched my pockets for sea shells, we gathered up our loudly clanking bottles of tequila, walked past the table of confiscated seas shells, right up to our stateroom without a word said.

Another day at sea was spent in the gym, the pools, the bars and eating wonderful food with wonderful friends. We dropped anchor off of Grand Caymen for our last port of call, Georgetown. The shore excursion I had reserved was an air-conditioned bus tour of the island of Grand Cayman. We learned that 10 British ships, in an 18th century convoy, all wrecked on the same reef on the same night. Because the Caymanees rescued the crews, the British King granted the Cayman Islands tax-free status, which remains to this day. There are more companies registered in Cayman than there are people living there. There are 550 banks just in the capital city of Georgetown. There are entire neighborhoods of foreign BILLIONAIREs (with a B.) Foreign billionaires own 70% of the waterfront in Georgetown. The minimum wage has been \$6 for over three decades. At one point, there was a proposition to raise the minimum wage. It was big news, and everyone was excited. Then, there was silence. The billionaires own all the businesses in the Caymans. The billionaires paid off the politicians rather than allow a higher minimum wage.

There was one more day at sea. We had to travel all the way from the Caymans back to Ft Lauderdale. That Saturday evening, ASPS members all gathered for dinner to celebrate Jim Gorman's 80th birthday. There is no better way to end a great vacation with great friends than to celebrate with a wonderful meal while at sea. Happy birthday, Jim!

I knew that misery was coming the next morning though. Every Sunday morning, 8 ships carrying 3500 folks dock at Port Everglades and all those people head to the Ft Lauderdale airport at the same time! Last year when we arrived at the airport, it was like a refugee camp. We were all deposited there from the cruise ships between 9 and 10 AM. You couldn't check bags until 2 hrs before your flight so the entire ticketing area was packed with "refugees" camping out on the floor, waiting to check their bags. As the afternoon approached, the usual Florida thunderstorms started to roll in. Before they struck, there was a tiny window of time that planes were able to leave, and thankfully Lorrie and I were on the last plane out. Many of our friends were stuck in the airport overnight. Lesson learned!

This year, we reserved an 11 AM flight. We caught the cruise ship transfer shuttle at 8 AM. We beat the onslaught of cruise ship refugees to the airport. Checked bags at the curb. No lines. Waited an hour to board and made it to BWI just before the high winds arrived that eventually closed the Bay Bridge and caused flights from FLL to be delayed or cancelled. I don't know how many times Lorrie said, "Thank you, Jeff, for your foresight in planning!" (The answer is zero.)

We really had a great time at the annual meeting and on the cruise hanging out with good ASPS friends. Our travel agent and fellow USPS member, Dawn Eckhart of Dawn's Travel Deals, does a fantastic job setting up these trips. She has worked with us for the past year on every detail. She kept us informed, gave recommendations, and unlike me, answered our inquiries within minutes. She even set up the wonderful Mimosa party on the transfer bus! Think about going next year.
















Executive Officer Lt/C Ralph Leasure, AP


Our squadron has so much to offer to fellow boaters – continuing education, safe boating surveys, community service, and great socializing! It takes all of us to spread the word about our organization!



### **Critical Emergency: Crew Overboard!** Terry Slattery, Lord of the Electrons

There are few things as serious as a crew member going overboard. Capn Fred, who taught me a lot about big powerboats, says that the cardinal rule of boating is "Keep the water on the outside and the crew inside." Regardless of the safety protocols, a crew member may go overboard, and being prepared for the situation is paramount. Let's talk about some options for tracking an overboard crew member (historically called a Man OverBoard, or MOB), for those cases where there is no tether to the boat.

Let's say that the boat is making 5 knots. That's 8.4 feet per second. Getting notification of the crew overboard and starting to take action could take at least a minute, and often more. That 60 seconds separates the crew

member and boat by 504 feet. The head of the crew member, hopefully with a PFD, may not be obvious from that far away. This is why another crew member should always point to the last known position of the MOB. But, that's typically a problem for short-handed boating. Flags, whistles, and lights have been the main methods of tracking a MOB for generations.

It should be obvious, but worth pointing out, that the best chance for a rescue is by the vessel that the crew member was on, because it's the closest. This assumes that the remaining crew is capable of running the boat and returning to pick up the MOB. I'll discuss recovery by other boats in another safety article.

Still, finding the MOB is challenging, even in the best of conditions. The latest approach is to use some modern technology. Several companies have created wearable beacons that, when paired with a Bluetooth enabled phone or tablet, can set off alarms when a crew member goes overboard. ### **CrewWatcher MOB System**

Some devices are water activated, but most are triggered when the beacon's signal goes out of range of the phone/tablet, typically on the order of 50 feet. When this occurs, the phone/ tablet records its GPS position and sounds the alert. The wearable devices tend to be relatively inexpensive, typically under \$100 each, and multiple devices can be paired with a single phone/tablet. These are great for tracking pets as well as crew. But there are many caveats to these devices that you should be aware of and be prepared to mitigate.

The phone/tablet that the device is paired with needs to be turned on, located where the alarm can be heard, and the app needs to be running. This implies that the phone/tablet needs to be plugged into a power supply that will allow the app to run when you want the system active.

Consider how much you intend to use it and whether you'll want your phone/tablet connected to a power source. For example, do you want to attach a beacon to a pet collar or child's clothing to monitor it while at anchor or in a marina? Does the beacon need to be regularly charged or have batteries replaced? Does the app show beacon battery status so you know when to replace or charge them?


Can the beacons be paired with more than one phone/tablet at a time, or is it easy to change the pairing? You'll need a way to switch the alarm phone/tablet before you forget about the app and hop off the boat in a marina, only to have the alarm go off as you walk down the dock.



There's another situation out on the water: the only alarm is on your phone/tablet on the boat. Other vessels in the area won't be automatically notified; you'll need to make a MayDay call on VHF if you need assistance.

Most of these low-cost systems only report on water detection or loss of connectivity. They report the GPS coordinates where the alarm occurred and do not continuously update the MOB's position. The MOB could be swept away from the alarm point in areas with high currents, like inlets and rivers, greatly expanding the search area. Remember, a five knot current would move the MOB 504 feet every minute. If this is your typical boating environment, you may prefer the AIS/DSC personal locator beacons, which I'll discuss next month.



### Dinner Delights Lt/C Georgiana Maszczenski, S

Couldn't make our February meeting? You missed a very informative presentation – *How Can Humans and the Waters Have a Healthy Relationship?* Our guest speaker was Dr. Lora Harris, Estuarine Ecologist at the Chesapeake Biological Laboratory located in Solomons. This center, a part of the University of Maryland system, is the oldest state-supported marine laboratory on the East Coast of the United States.

Here are some of the interesting facts from that meeting:

 $\star$  Dr. Harris and her team develop numerical models on ways to restore the bay and its tributaries.

- ★ These numerical models allow the team to see what could happen when different factors are changed.
- ★ Dr. Harris has learned that the best change happens at small levels. Implementation of a change happens at 5 square kilometers or less. In other words, change works best when we focus on problem solving at the community level.
- ★ One of the most important chemical elements affecting water quality is nitrogen.
- ★ Her work includes continual sampling of the waters around Solomons. They look for algae growth as well as decreases in oxygen levels.



- ★ Dr. Harris received funding to look at fishing in the Baltimore Harbor. The study looked at urban fishing and the contaminant risks to eating the fish.
- ★ Her work in the Patapsco River led to a finding of increased total mercury in adult perch.
- ★ Dr. Harris and her team work to interact with the community to encourage involvement in efforts to improve water quality. One approach has been to explain how environmental problems impact economies in the region.
