#### REMINDER! NEW MARINE FIRE EXTINGUISHER REGULATIONS TO TAKE EFFECT APRIL 20, 2022

This spring, it's more important than ever to check your boat's marine fire extinguisher. A new federal regulation for fire extinguishers on motorized recreational boats will take effect on April 20. Extinguishers older than 12 years from the manufacture date are no longer considered good and serviceable and should be replaced with a newer fire extinguisher. This includes both disposable (non-rechargeable) and rechargeable fire extinguishers.

#### If you own a boat model year 2018 or newer, you may need to replace your fire extinguishers.

- In addition to meeting the carriage requirements for the correct number of extinguishers for the size of your boat, they must be labeled as 5-B or 20-B; extinguishers labeled with B-I or B-II only are no longer acceptable.
- Extinguishers must not be more than 12 years old according to the date of manufacture stamped on the bottle or printed on the label.

You are only required get new ones if the extinguishers are no longer serviceable. Good serviceable conditions are as follows: the extinguisher has a pressure gauge reading or indicator it must be in the operable range or position; the lock pin is firmly in place; the discharge nozzle is clean and free of obstruction; the extinguisher does not show visible signs of significant corrosion or damage.

#### If you own a boat that is 2017 model year or older (between 1953-2017):

- You may keep your extinguishers labeled B-I and B-II, but
- Extinguishers must not be more than 12 years old according to the date of manufacture stamped on the bottle.

Happy spring, merry mariners! Thanks for re-electing me! In lieu of the dark and glamorous mysteries of minutes-keeping, I researched the Notices to Mariners, and noted that if you are out and about below the Patapsco, keep an eye on the dredging activity around the Ever Forward, Evergreen's grounded containership. Haven't heard why it struck...but from the track it sure looks like they missed the dogleg in the channel and kept going straight, striking the eastern edge of the channel where it is about 20' too shallow for their draft, at a reported 13 knots. Well, we'll see; unless something broke, it looks sort of bad for the Master, or the Bay Pilot aboard. Hopefully it's gone by the time we all hit the water in earnest.

So, the next best topic is vessel preparation, including getting ready for your Vessel Safety Check:

<u>S/V Certainty</u>: Our baby is under tarps in the yard at Maryland Marina for the winter, shooting for a launch in early May. No major repairs 'On The Horizon' for this year, but the plan this spring is to do some upgrades in the cabin – I replaced the floor with a laminate a couple of years ago, rewired the mast and upgraded the electrical panel to accommodate the new anchoring, cruising, and deck lights in 2020, added a better bilge pump last year, and this year I replaced the one-burner stove (found out the old one was recalled in like 2001 for gas leaks, which has happened) and am going to try to raise the kitchenette countertop a little – it has settled a bit over the years (it's an '84 hull), making it harder to slide the lower doors to access the cookware storage area, and the outgoing through-hull for the sink and bilge pump. Also want to do some re-wiring, some of the 120v stuff was done with household wire instead of marine wire, aaagh!! Not much, fortunately, just from the electrical panel to the bathroom outlet on the starboard side, I think. I already replaced the main 12v line from the battery bank to the panel after the old one failed...and I found out why, there was a loosely taped wire-nut connection hanging down into the bilge under the cockpit, aaaagh! Oh well, every day in every way she's getting better and better.

Then just gotta scrape and paint the antifouling on the lower hull, wash her, check every screw and fitting, de-winterize and mount the outboard, check the nav lights, step the mast, lube and check the trailer, and we're off for the move ¼ mile up Frog Mortar Creek to Parkside Marina, where she lives for the season. O

well, that's what weekends are for. Hope to see you out there!
